A STRONG REBUKE FOR LODGEISM

ONE of the most extended test votes thus far taken on the peace treaty is that of the intercollegiate referendum carried out on a nation-wide basis.

It is announced that the vote gathered from 32 colleges, including the big eastern universities, showed results as follows:
Ratification through compromise.....11,182
Ratification without reservations.....9,002
For Lodge reservations.....6,563
Opposed to the treaty.....3,163

It will be seen from the above that out of 26,747 who say they favor ratification of the treaty only 6563 favor the Lodge reservations. This despite the fact that Lodge has declared his reservations to be the "irreducible minimum" and that the fight centers around the Lodge position, not over the question of an unreserved ratification.

The president's position has never been one of opposition to reservations that do not annul important features of the treaty. On his western trip he repeatedly stated his readiness to accept what is generally classed as "mild reservations," though he declared position they are needless. In his Jackson day letter he made that position even more clear than formerly.

It is fair to assume therefore that the bulk of students voting for compromise favor the president's position, not the Lodge proposal. Those supporting Lodge had an opportunity to express themselves in direct manner and it is reasonable to suppose they did so.

Assuming that the student vote is representative of popular sentiment, it is plain that the Lodge position is repudiated, five to one, and that the Round Robin gentlemen will find hard sledding if they go before the country on the stand they announced when the treaty was rejected in December.

WHY A STRAIGHT JACKET?

THERE is some merit and considerable danger in the proposal that a two-thirds affirmative vote be required to enact a constitutional amendment. At times it becomes absolutely essential to the state's welfare to adopt an amendment bearing on such a subject as say taxation, roads or schools. Provide that a two-thirds vote is necessary in such cases and you may merely close the door on needed development.

It may take time and experimenting to find the best solution of the parking problem in Pendleton, but steps to this end should be taken and necessarily such efforts should be based on the idea that the streets are intended for traffic and not for storage purpose.

Spain is ready to adhere to the league of nations and has asked for no amendments or special privileges. All the boys will soon be swimming except Uncle Sam, who according to the senate must not go near the water without his rubbers.

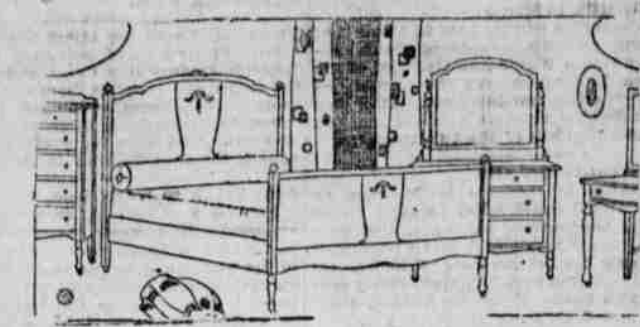

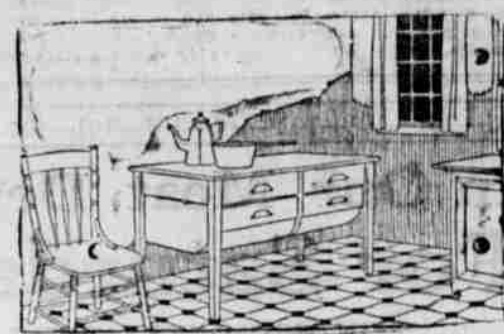
