GRAIN AND POTATO SCHOOL WILL MEET AT WESTON FEB. 13

Noted State Speakers Will Aid County Agent in Program Planned for Occasion by County Farm Bureau.

Farmers of Umatilla county are planning to attend a grain and potato inspection school which will be held at Weston Friday and Saturday, February 13 and 14, under the auspices of the Farm Bureau.

expert, of O. A. C., will attend as instructor and lecturer. Fred Hennion, county agricultural agent, will be another who will appear on the program. Following is the program, as arranged by the Farm Bureau Committee:
Course 1: Grain Grading and Inspection.
1. Dockage and its determination.
2. Varietal mixtures; their determination, grading and utilization.
3. Standard varieties.
4. Color and texture of wheat as indicative of gluten content and milling value.
5. Smut dockage and value and uses of smutty wheat.
6. Factors affecting wheat value and shipping point.
Course 2: Wheat Production for Eastern Oregon.
1. Summer following methods and need best production for maximum yields.
2. Standard variety, seed treatment, time, rate and manner of seeding.
3. Special production problems: (a) Weed control. (b) Minimizing frost injury. (c) Controlling volunteer. (d) Winter killing.
4. Wheat harvest, handling and marketing methods.
Course 3: Potato Production.
1. Potato varieties, their identification and improvement.
2. Potato soils and their preparation and fertilization.
3. How to plant and grow a crop of potatoes.
4. Potato storage.
5. Potato marketing—grading.

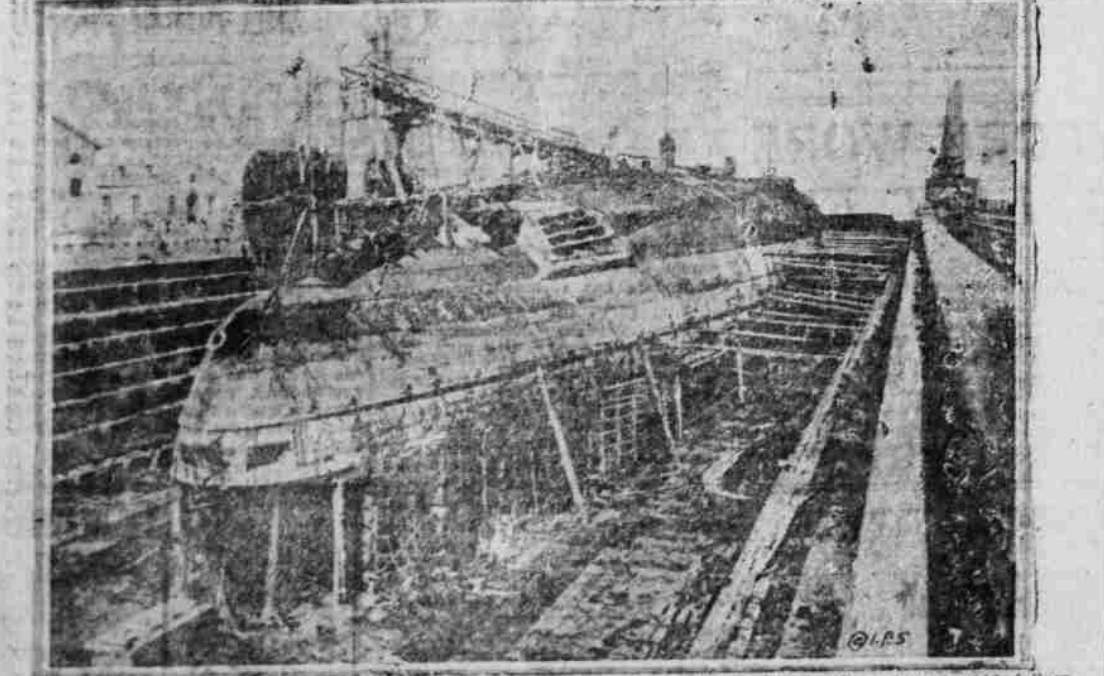
LOCAL Y. M. C. A. TO HAVE THREE LEAGUES

15, and a third for young men of 16 and over.
Definite schedules have not yet been announced but it is probable that the smaller boys' games will take place at the high school gymnasium on Saturday mornings, while the other leagues will arrange for evening meetings.
County Committee Named.
As part of the county program, an educational service committee for Umatilla county has been named by the county Y. M. C. A. committee to make arrangements for the use of a limited sum of money which the National War Work council has placed at the disposal of the Inter-State committee of Oregon and Idaho for educational work among ex-service men. The committee which will make this service available for the ex-service men of this county consists of P. P. Austin, chairman, R. C. Bishop, H. J. Warner, A. J. Owen and E. Broer. Mr. Austin will also act in the capacity of vocational adviser to such men as need help in settling occupational problems.
The promise of the funds for use among ex-service men is a part of a national program providing free scholarship in Y. M. C. A. and other accredited schools; a limited sum for college and university scholarships; also a plan of home study courses.
Convention to be Held.
Cash Wopf, county secretary of the Y. M. C. A., has received the preliminary announcement of the Annual Inter-state Convention of Y. M. C. A.'s in Oregon and Idaho, to be held at McMinnville, Oregon, January 26, 21, and February 1.
While most are called to the convention primarily for the counsel and help which they can give, a group of strong speakers from this territory will be supplemented by secretaries from other fields.
Heading this list is Harry Holmes, associate general secretary for England, who had direction during the war of all association work among the British in France. One of the speakers will be Bopin Chandra Chircar, of the National Association Council of India. Three western department secretaries from California, Geo. D. McDill, Gale Seaman and H. O. Stone are expected.

Italian engineers are confident that the dreadnaught Leonardo da Vinci, which sank on Aug. 2, 1916, following an internal explosion of the munition stores, will be perfectly serviceable when she has been re-launched from drydock at Taranto. The battleship turned turtle when she was raised upside down and taken in that position to Taranto. This photograph shows her still upside down, in drydock. Naval engineers say she will right herself when she goes into the water. The port side of the Leonardo da Vinci is seen here as she rests on timber supports, the stern being in the foreground.
