WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The dispute between the United States and Mexico over the drilling of American oil wells in the Tampico district is settled, according to private advice received from Mexico City. Under the agreement, Carranza has withdrawn the edict against the development of American wells. The question of nationalization of the fields remain in abeyance for the present. The drilling of American wells will be resumed in Tampico, Tampico and other fields Monday, according to this information.

MIDDLE WEST CITIES VISITED BY STRANGE MALADY; MORE ILL

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 17.—A mysterious stomach malady, which so far has baffled the efforts of physicians to locate a cause for it, is sweeping Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma, according to reports received here today. Topeka reported 1800 cases, Muskogee, Okla., 2000, Jefferson City, Mo., 200 cases, while there were said to be several hundred cases in Kansas City. Four deaths have occurred at Skiatook, Okla., with several hundred cases.

According to best reports the victim is afflicted with backache, headache, vomiting and other symptoms, similar to those of "flu." However, the backache is not as severe, if precautions are taken early. Dr. E. G. Brown, city health officer, says the malady is "intestinal influenza," while Dr. C. H. Lerrigood of the Kansas state board of health believes it to be either winter cholera or winter dysentery.

Other Kansas towns besides Topeka reporting cases today were Atchison and Pittsburg. Oklahoma City also reports some cases today.

MISSIONARIES CHARGED WITH AGITATION OF KOREAN DISTURBANCE

TOKIO, Jan. 17.—Admiral Baron Saito, governor general of Korea, in an interview in the Osaka Asahi, is quoted as saying Christian missionaries are behind the disturbances in Korea.

"E. W. Schofield, belonging to the Severance hospital at Seoul, is one of the most pronounced type of these agitators," the admiral is quoted as saying. "I met Schofield before my arrival at Korea, and he was then and is now giving expression to the most violent views and he has always been striving to encourage Korean opposition to the Japanese government."

"Mr. Schofield is a most dangerous man, assiduously carrying on the independence agitation in Korea and even among the missionaries there are many who look askance at his vehement methods."

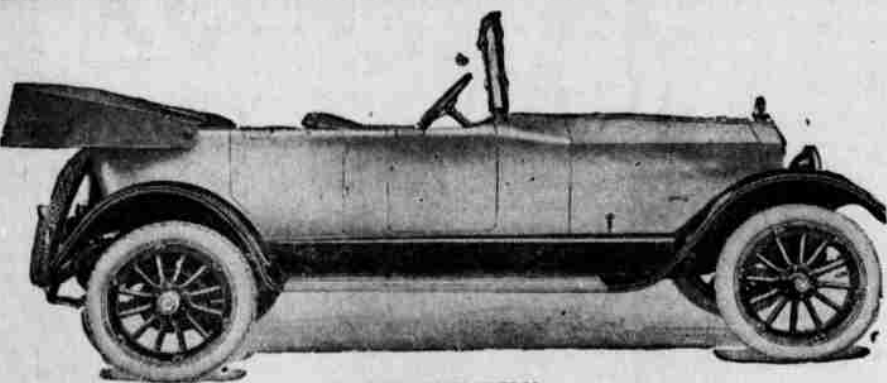
