PORTLAND TOMORROW WILL ENTERTAIN HERO OF AMERICA'S WAR

General John J. Pershing in
Tour of Country, Asks Talk
With Ex-Service Men But
Not "Too Many Speeches."

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—Portland will have the pleasure tomorrow of entertaining General John J. Pershing.

The man who led America's forces overseas will arrive in the city at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, accompanied by his nine staff officers.

The general is making a tour of the country's army posts and cantonments. A military reception will be held at the Union station upon the general's arrival. A parade through the business section of the city will follow.

Pershing will then be escorted to the Armory, where he will address members of the American Legion. He will be a guest of the Chamber of Commerce at a banquet in the evening, after which a public reception will be held at the public auditorium.

Pershing and his staff will leave Portland at 11 o'clock Sunday night for Camp Lewis. Three days will be spent in the Tacoma-Seattle locality. It was the general's own request that arrangements be made for him to talk to the ex-service men. His only other suggestion about his visit to Portland was that he be not asked to make "too many speeches."

DEMURRER TO NEWBERRY INDICTMENTS REFUSED

GRAND RAPIDS, Jan. 17.—Judge Sessions Monday denied a demurrer to indictments charging United States Senator Newberry and 134 others with election frauds. Arguments by Newberry's attorneys that the indictments are unconstitutional were declared without foundation by Sessions.

COMPENSATION RATE OF WAR RISK ACT IS RAISED BY AMENDMENT

New Law Provides Monthly
Fund Equal to Degree of Reduction in Earning Capacity
Due to Disability.

Rate of compensation for temporary total disability has been greatly increased, according to recent laws passed which amend the War Risk Insurance Act.

Following are the old and new awards for temporary total disability:

W.I.L.L.	As Amended
With neither wife nor child.....	\$ 80
With wife but no child 45	95
With wife and one child.....	95
With wife and two children.....	100
With wife and three or more children.....	100
With no wife but one child.....	90
With no wife but two children.....	95
With no wife but three children.....	100

Extra allowance for dependent father of mother or both, \$10 each.	

Total and Permanent Disability
The award for total and permanent disability is \$100, and if the disabled person is so helpless as to be in constant need of a nurse or attendant, an additional allowance, not to exceed \$20 is given.

In addition, the new law provides that compensation for the loss of one foot and one hand, or one foot and the sight of one eye, or one hand and the sight of one eye shall be \$100. The new law provides that for double, total and permanent disability the rate of compensation shall be \$200.

New Rules Given
The new law provides that if and while the disability is rated partial and temporary, the monthly compensation shall be a percentage of the compensation that would be payable for total and temporary disability, equal to the degree of the reduction in earning capacity resulting from the disability. If and while the disability is rated as partial and permanent, the monthly compensation shall be a percentage of the compensation that would be payable for total and permanent disability equal to the degree of the reduction in earning capacity resulting from the disability.

Beneficiaries Named
War term insurance or United States Government life (converted) insurance policies may be made payable to any of the following list of beneficiaries: Parent, grandparent, stepparent, adopted parent, wife or husband, child, grandchild, stepchild, adopted child, brother, sister, half-sister, half-brother, brother through adoption, sister through adoption, stepbrother, step-sister, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, a person who has stood in the relation of a parent to the insured for a period of one year or more prior to the insured's enlistment or induction, the children of such person, parent, grandparent, stepparent, or parent through adoption of the insured's wife or husband.

NEW YORK TOWN WILL CELEBRATE MUSIC WEEK

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., Jan. 17.—New Rochelle is preparing to celebrate Music Week, as the first seven days of February have been designated by the National Bureau for the Advancement of Music. Rossini's "Stabat Mater" will be given by a quartet of oratorio singers from New York, a local chorus of one hundred and an orchestra of twenty. Miss Veronica, chairman of the committee and Mayor Harry Scott honorary chairman. Among others actively interested are Countess Sedofr Argilagos, prima donna of Paris, London and Italy, and Miss Emily Grant von Tetzl, writer and critic.

PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY; IS 57 YEARS OLD TODAY

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Premier Lloyd George celebrated his fifty-seventh birthday today, and was the recipient of many congratulations. In his stormy political career, the "little Welsh Wizard" has experienced many ups and downs, being perhaps the most venomously attacked politician of his time a few years ago, but today there is little venom among his opponents, and practically the whole British nation united in wishing birthday compliments to the man.

King George, Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales and many royalties were among the earliest to send congratulatory messages. Others following from President Poincaré, Premier Clemenceau, and other allied statesmen.

MILTON WOMEN PLAN AUXILIARY TO LEGION

MILTON, Jan. 17.—For the purpose of forming a woman's auxiliary to the Post of the American Legion, a meeting of the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of all men from the Milton-Freewater territory, who were members of the United States military or naval forces between April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918, has been called to be held in the public library in Milton, Wednesday afternoon, January 21, at 2 o'clock.

In addition to forming a preliminary organization it will be the purpose of this organization to make formal application for a charter for the local Woman's Auxiliary.

All persons who are eligible for membership in this organization are being urged to be present at the Wednesday meeting.

WILL DOUBLE OUTPUT OF GAS WITHIN WEEK

Pendleton's gas output will be doubled within the coming week owing to the greatly increased consumption during the past fall and winter. Dr. F. W. Vincent, local manager of the Pacific Power & Light Co., announced Friday. The output will be increased from 60,000 cubic feet to 120,000 cubic feet per day when the change is made.

Only one bench of six reports has been in use in the local plant but a second bench of the same capacity will be put into service. With the two benches at work, more than sufficient gas for all the local needs will be available, Dr. Vincent said.

ALLIES ARE PLANNING TO OPPOSE BOLSHIEVSKI

LONDON, Jan. 17.—"Momentous decisions regarding Russia," are pending in the conference of allied leaders in Paris in the opinion of the London press. Newspapers saw in the urgent summoning of army and navy officials to Paris the probability of plans for an offensive against the bolsheviks. It is likewise considered significant that the entire Atlantic fleet is assembling in Plymouth harbor for the so-called spring cruise in the Mediterranean.

SECRET SERVICE CREW CALLED FOR OTHER HALF

DETROIT, Jan. 17.—"If you want the other half call on me," Q. S. Ting, chairman, wrote to Miss B. Baker today enclosing half of a \$10 bill. Secret service men called on him instead.

TWO NEW DIRECTORS NAMED BY ATHENA BANK

ATHENA, Jan. 17.—At the annual meeting of stockholders of The First National Bank of Athena, two new directors, M. W. Hansell and Henry Dell, were elected.

The personnel of the board now comprises W. B. Shaffer, M. L. Watts, F. S. LeGrow, M. W. Hansell and Henry Dell. Ralph Cannon, a former director who has engaged in farming, had disposed of his bank stock. Mr. Koepke, who was another member of the board, still retains his stock but has moved to California. The two new directors are young men, prominent in the community.

The bank reported a remarkably good business showing for the past fiscal year. Its officers were re-elected, as follows: W. B. Shaffer, president; M. L. Watts, vice president; F. S. LeGrow, cashier; Max B. Bopper, assistant cashier.

HIGH SCHOOL TO GIVE NEW WORK NEXT TERM

WITH TRAIN CREW TIED, SIX BANDITS HAND OFF 75 BARRELS OF BOOZE

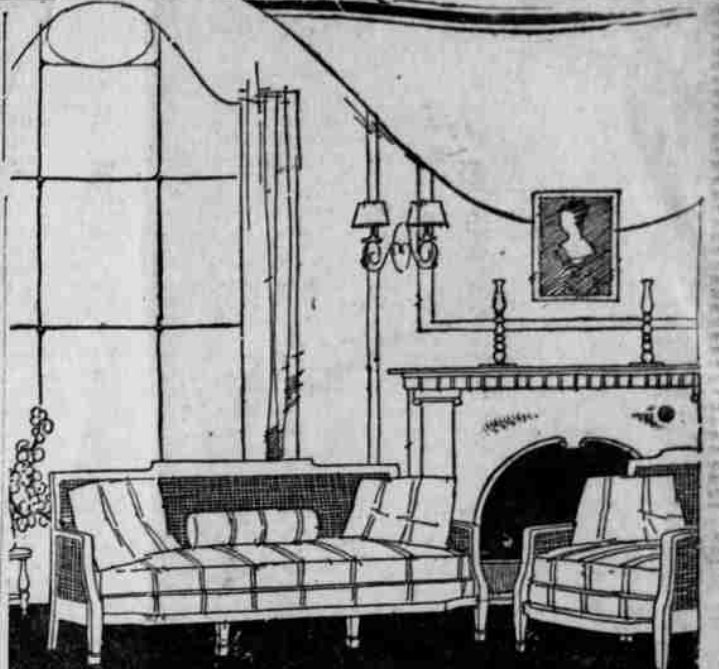
CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Six bandits tied the yardmaster and seven members of a freight train crew in the Pennsylvania yards early today, broke into two cars and escaped with 75 barrels of liquor, valued at \$100,000.

Charles Gray, yardmaster, said the bandits entered his office, bound him with a rope, cut telephone wires leading from the building and proceeded to the yards. They tied the engineer, fireman and five others of the train crew and loaded the whiskey into four auto trucks. The helpless crew and yardmaster were not discovered until several hours later when the day crew reported for duty.
