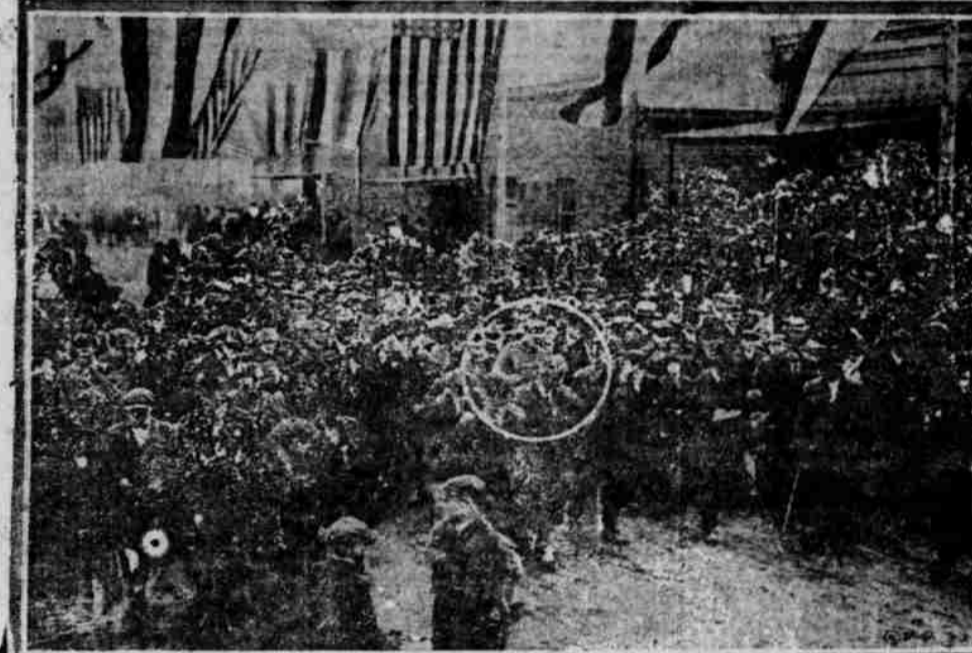
### LADIES AID ELECTS OFFICERS FOR YEAR
