**NEW JERSEY GOVERNOR WILL FIGHT PROHIBITION**  
TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 21.—Governor Edwards, in his inaugural address urged a legislature for legislation assuring the people the "right to live under conditions satisfactory to them," and urged the passage of resolution refusing to ratify or accept the federal prohibition amendment. "I will do everything lawful to have it determined that the present conditions of affairs with respect to prohibition has been illegally forced upon the people of this state," he declared. Edwards said he is determined to carry out his campaign promises. He announced he would request the state's attorney general to petition the supreme court of the United States for speedy determination of the validity of the amendment and the legality of its ratification.
