

TWO DUBLIN POLICE SHOT DEAD AND TOWN IS OWN IN PANIC BY BLOTTED AND RIOTING

Enraged Officers and Soldiers, Following Murder of Comrades
Open Fire on Houses, Shattering Windows and Littering
Streets With Wreckage But Unknown Assailants Escape.

DUBLIN, Jan. 22.—The government and military authorities are taking extraordinary precautions today to prevent further outbreaks following the shooting of two policemen in the last 48 hours. Assistant Police Commissioner Hedmond was shot dead by an unknown assailant last night. The assailant escaped. Rioting followed the shooting of Policeman Pinner by unknown persons Tuesday night. Bands of enraged police and soldiers gathered after the shooting and opened fire on a number of houses. Shop windows were smashed and the town was thrown into a panic. The streets were littered with wreckage when the disorders subsided.

ALL 27 APARTMENTS WILL HAVE PHONES

Contracts were signed today between the Security Loan & Investment Co., and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., for telephone service in the new Security Apartments, work on which was begun Saturday. There will be telephone service in each of the 27 apartments in the building.

Wall phones will be installed and there will be a switch for either outside connection or communication with the janitor and the front door. Occupants of the apartments may speak with prospective callers at the vestibule through the same phone they use for calling the grocer or persons at a distance, by merely switching a lever.

Under each phone will be a push button which will automatically release the lock on the front door and allow outsiders to enter. This is standard equipment for apartments in large cities and does away with one's running to the door to admit callers.

LEGION POSTS SEEK EVERY SERVICE MAN

A membership campaign to enlist every ex-service man in Umatilla county in one of the four American Legion posts at Hermiston, Pendleton and Milton. Weston, the fourth post in the county, was not represented. The drive is planned to take place during the latter part of February, the exact dates to be determined later. Following the drive it is planned to have a celebration in Pendleton to which all legion men in the county will be invited. Just what form this celebration is to take will also be determined upon later. The Pendleton Post will undoubtedly be hosts.

Permanent organization of this county-wide committee of delegates was postponed until after the regular monthly meetings of the posts on the first Monday in February. In the meantime, Lyman Rice, temporary chairman, will continue in that capacity.

W. W. WILDER, ON TRIAL FOR M'NEECE MURDER, ACCUSES STATES STAR WITNESS OF CRIME

Responsibility for the shooting of Bert McNece was denied by W. W. Wilder this morning when he took the stand as first witness for the defense in his trial for second degree murder. Charles Jones, who on Wednesday afternoon was introduced as star witness for the state, was accused by Wilder of having shot McNece.

Wilder's accusation created a mild sensation in court room and confirmed the belief of the prosecution and of the audience that the defense was attempting to prove that Wilder had not done the shooting. Jones, who, it developed yesterday, was the one, and only eye-witness to the shooting, declared that Wilder shot and killed McNece on the afternoon of Sunday, September 14, 1919.

Points Against Defense.
Two telling points against the defense so far, however, are the alleged confession of the crime which Wilder made before Sheriff Til Taylor and Deputy Joe Blakely and Jones' assertion that Attorney George M. Bishop, counsel for Wilder, called him into his office and requested that he change his story, in which he told that he saw Wilder fire two pistol shots at McNece.

In the examination of Wilder today he declared that the alleged confession was made to the sheriff in order to stop the third degree to which the sheriff subjected him. He testified that he was within his house at the time of the shooting and, upon hearing two shots fired, immediately went out. He saw Jones, pistol in hand, and McNece, in flight, fall dead.

NEARLY 40 YEARS OF HISTORY RECALLED IN OLD WALLS' RAZING

Nearly 40 years of history were recalled today when Judge Thomas F. Fitzgerald issued a permit to Clark Dunlap for the razing of the old building on the K. of P. property at the corner of Main and Water streets. The old structure will be removed at once to make way for the \$39,000 mansion planned by the Ellis-Schiller Co., local Dodge distributors.

In 1881, when Judge Fitzgerald first came to Pendleton to practice law, he opened offices in the second story of the historic old building. Other lawyers having offices there were D. N. Connelly, J. C. Leasure and Fred Paige Tuttle.

Lot Livermore was at that time postmaster and the postoffice occupied the room until recently when it was moved to the new Mountain Motors Co. Mr. Livermore was also agent for the Wells Fargo Express Co. for in those days there was no parcel post handled by the postal department and Wells Fargo was one of the few express companies.

The building has changed hands a number of times in the 39 years but until sold two weeks ago by the K. of P. lodge to the auto dealers, had undergone few changes. Tenants have been moved out already and the historic old building will soon be removed from the landscape and room made for a more modern structure to house the more modern industry of automobile service.

EDWARD L. M'BROOM IS CALLED BY DEATH

Edward L. M'Broom, aged 50 years, who has resided in Pendleton for the past eight years, died in Portland this morning at 8:30. Mr. M'Broom had been in failing health for some time. He is survived by two daughters, Miss Emily M'Broom and Mrs. P. M. Griggs, of this city, four sisters, Mrs. J. L. Hall and Mrs. D. P. Hicks, of Pendleton, Mrs. J. W. David, of Milton, and Mrs. H. D. Newell, of Klamath Falls, and one brother, Robert L. M'Broom, of Globe, Arizona. Mrs. M'Broom died just fifteen years ago, her death occurring January 20, 1905.

Mr. M'Broom was in the stock business in Grant county and in Pilot Rock before he came to Pendleton. He was a member of the Masons lodge, and funeral arrangements have not yet been made but the body will be shipped to Pendleton tonight.

SUICIDE STORY FRAMED.

The two men, friends since Jones was a child, agreed upon the suicide story, Wilder continued, immediately following the shooting. Jones went to the home of his brother-in-law, Frank Estoup, Wilder said.

Throughout his stay on the stand this morning, Wilder was almost unflinchingly calm. He spoke up with a directness that bespoke not a whit of fear. He made his story appear direct and his attitude was characterized by spectators as "hard-boiled." Throughout the examination of witnesses by the state yesterday Wilder sat between his two attorneys quite emotionless and contented himself with occasionally refreshing his mind of chewing tobacco. Behind him sat his wife and small daughter.

Jones Testimony Surprises.
During the trial yesterday afternoon the state sprung the surprise by introducing Charles Jones as its star witness. Jones, a man 35 years old, married and having five children, testified that he had known the accused for the greater part of his life and that he was employed with him at the time of the shooting. Jones declared that he saw Wilder fire two shots, but a few seconds apart, at McNece and that he grabbed Wilder's arm and the latter dropped the pistol.

"No one can steal \$50 from me and get away with it," Jones quoted Wilder as having said. "One"

DEATH RUMOR IS SPREAD THROUGH HOLLAND TOWNS

United Press Unable to Confirm Report Brought to Paris From Land Where Former Monarch Seeks Seclusion.

SAID TO HAVE BEEN WALKING IN GARDEN

Account of Sudden Severe or Fatal Illness Declares German War Ruler Was Overcome at Amerongen Sunday.

PARIS, Jan. 22.—Travelers arriving today from Amerongen reported that the former kaiser suffered a stroke of paralysis while walking in the garden of his home at Amerongen, Sunday. They said rumors of his death have been circulated in Holland. The United Press is unable to confirm the report.

SPOKANE TRIO, FREED ON CHARGE OF MURDER, AT ONCE REARRESTED

Two Sisters and Brother Declared Not Guilty After 15 Hours' Deliberation, Then Face New Accusation.

SPOKANE, Jan. 22.—Marie, Ted and Fay McDonald, charged with the murder of W. H. McNutt, realty dealer, were all found not guilty by the jury after deliberation of 15 hours. The defense held that Will McDonald, a missing brother of the trio, killed McNutt when he found the latter attacking Marie.

The verdict in the case of Marie McDonald was read first. For a time she sat as though stunned. Then a smile covered her face and she broke into tears. Ted McDonald leaned over and put his arm around her. The jurors stood before Marie's face unheeded. Fay smiled slowly when the verdict of her case was read.

McNutt was slain the night of June 24 during an alleged altercation regarding a realty deal with the McDonalds. Several months later the body was found buried on his ranch at Scandia, Wash., horribly mutilated.

Immediately Rearrested.

The three McDonalds were immediately rearrested. Marie was charged with trying to pass a forged check at a store here. Fay was charged with endorsing a forged check and Ted was charged with stealing the McNutt automobile which the McDonalds took to California with them, following McNutt's death.

SPOKANE, Jan. 22.—The jury in its deliberation in the case of Marie, Fay and Ted McDonald, jointly charged with the murder of W. H. McNutt, realty dealer, last June. The case went to the jury late yesterday. Marie McDonald, eldest of the trio, who is believed to be slowly dying from tuberculosis, broke yesterday under the strain of the trial. Today in her cell she looks years older than she did a week ago.

**PALMER CONFERS WITH
WILSON ON SEDITION**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Attorney General Palmer conferred today at the White House on the sedition bill. The conference delayed his appearance before the house rules committee to insist on the passage of this legislation.

Palmer, in a letter to the committee, declared that neither the Graham nor Sterling bills are satisfactory to him but legislation along the line he previously suggested is necessary. He submitted a copy of the bill he desires passed.

Samuel Gompers, at the request of the committee appeared as the "first witness." He said the sedition bills pending in congress are nothing more than anti-union legislation that will affect all industries. "The main purpose of legislation," he added, "is to prevent cessation of all work. It amounts to putting all workers of the country under involuntary servitude. It makes slaves of all free men."

Representatives of the negro press protested against the bill. They said if the bill becomes a law "negro publication committees will be denied the right to voice just and legitimate protests of the colored people."

CITY COUNCIL DENIES REQUEST FOR HANGERS FOR AIRPLANE FLEET

Former Milton Man Seeks Headquarters for Freight and Passenger Machines Which He Would Operate.

When air traffic through Pendleton becomes so heavy that public hangars for airplanes are necessary they will be built as private enterprises. The city council decided last night. Their attention was drawn to the subject of providing aerial garages by a telegraphic request from J. W. Smith, formerly of Milton, who is in Long Beach, Cal., buying several planes and the Armstrong place for freight and passengers in this district. Mr. Smith said that he had received promises from the Walla Walla Commercial Club at one time that they would erect hangars there to accommodate his fleet and other planes, which are expected soon to be frequent visitors in those parts. The Walla Wallans never took any further action, he said. Should Pendleton make some provision for housing planes when they alight here, Mr. Smith said he would make this the home port for his fleet.

As yet the city has not decided definitely on a landing field for planes and indications are that the Bitter place will not be entirely satisfactory. Several inquiries have come recently to Robert Jones regarding the use of his field on the north side for landing planes and the Armstrong place on the south side is also liked by some. Both of these places are considered too valuable for wheat raising, however.

Prepare for Center Parking

Coming to the city attorney's being indisposed, no ordinance for the new center parking system was presented last night. Chairman Pendleton of the ordinance committee said that the ordinance would be ready next week and asked permission of the council to go ahead with the making of the ordinance in effect. Signs must also be obtained and several hundred parking spaces painted on nearly a mile of street.

The city's advertisement for bids on a new fire truck was ordered changed, because of the fact that the specifications were such as to eliminate certain kinds of equipment. An order was made to change the advertisement and to readvertise. Several representatives of fire truck concerns were present at the meeting and had already presented their propositions to the fire committee.

Complaint was heard from V. Stroble regarding sewer troubles on Colwood street. The matter was referred to the house committee with power to act.

Cooperate on Camp Ground

C. K. Cranston, representing the Pendleton Commercial Association, announced that that body was now ready to cooperate with the council and the Automobile Association on the camp ground matter. The associations consists of Robert Simpson, Willard Bond and L. L. Rogers.

JAZZ LACKS OF MELODY AND TERPISCORIAN FAVOR SMILES AGAIN ON WALTZ

The craze for jazz dancing is on the wane and the waltz and two-step are winning favor in the realm of Terpischore, says Martin Jones, local dancing teacher who was formerly head instructor at the Seattle Hippodrome.

Mr. Jones says that the waltz—and he means that regular, old dreamy, shut-your-eyes kind—is decidedly the vogue and that it is evidently here to stay from the first number on the dance program to the final strains of the "Home Sweet Home." Second in popularity is the two-step, which in the cities is replacing the one-step, he states.

The lack of real melody in jazz music is given as the reason for the return of the old favorites, says Mr. Jones. He thinks that dancers are growing weary of the chatter of the average jazz orchestra and are turning to the gentle waltz and the snappy two-step for diversion.

PILOT ROCK LAUNCHES AUCTION SALE SERIES

The first of a series of auction sales will be held at Pilot Rock on February 6 and 7 under the auspices of the newly organized Pilot Rock Community Auction Sales Association, which consists of farmers, stockmen and businessmen of the community. Col. William Yohula is official auctioneer.

Lists have been sent out to all the residents of the south of the county and many have already been returned, enumerating articles which various persons desire to put up for auction. It is expected that all kinds of property, livestock and farming implements will be offered. Entries from as far as Ukiah have already been received.

Sales will be held at the stockyards, the Hinkle feed yard and the Eldridge garage and barn. The two days will be virtually holidays and it is expected that most of the people in that vicinity will attend. Frank T. Yohula is president and C. W. Paulina clerk of the association.

BOND MEASURE A LAW

SALEM, Jan. 22.—The ten million dollar highway bond bill which the legislature passed and about whose fate there has been considerable doubt since Governor Olcott began freely wielding the axe, today went to the secretary of state's office to automatically become a law. The bill carries an emergency clause, shutting off any chance of referring it to the people. Forty nine of the 97 measures the legislature passed have been approved and Olcott has vetoed 37. Eleven more await his decision.

UNIVERSITY AIDS FARMERS

MOSCOW, Jan. 22.—As a result of a meeting of farmers held at the University of Idaho definite action was taken toward merging all cooperative grain elevator and warehouse committees in the northwest in one big cooperative union.

LA GRIPPE OF MILD FORM PREVALENT IN CITY SAYS PHYSICIAN

Dr. Kavanaugh Tells Council of Meeting of Doctors to Consider Health Situation and Mayor Will Co-operate.

Influenza of the milder form, resembling the old fashioned la grippe, is prevalent in Pendleton, Dr. H. J. Kavanaugh, city physician, said before the city council last night. There are between 50 and 75 cases of this in a meeting yesterday afternoon, called by Dr. Kavanaugh for the purpose of ascertaining the seriousness of the situation.

The epidemic at this time is not as virulent as it was during last winter. Dr. Kavanaugh explained and so far only one case of pneumonia has developed. It is his belief that there will not be a return of the Spanish influenza, with wholesale pneumonia. The symptoms in most of the cases already reported include sore joints and muscles, heavy head and eyes and a cold.

Death Due to Complications.

The death of one person who was taken with la grippe was reported yesterday. Other complications accompanying the attack are held responsible, however.

No cases have been ordered quarantined by physicians, they told Dr. Kavanaugh at yesterday's meeting. The physician announced last night that it was not deemed advisable to call a general quarantine on the cases unless all schools, public gatherings and business were closed as was done last year. The council agreed to leave to the discretion of the mayor and city physician whether there should be a local quarantine of the "flu" cases or a general quarantine.

Mild Smallpox Found.

There is also smallpox in several homes here, which is for the most part mild. It has been difficult to get all the cases quarantined because of the mildness of the attacks. About 10 homes are reported quarantined. Children appearing at local schools with bad colds or any appearance of breaking out are being sent home and examined by a physician. Parents are being urged not to send their children to school if they have colds or appear to be afflicted with any rash.

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ANGERED BLACKS OVERPOWER PAIR WHO SEEK THIEF

Troops Summoned to Burnis Mills Entrain at Once at Camp Pike to Quell Disorders Between Whites and Negroes

SITUATION IS BELIEVED UNDER TROOP CONTROL

Officers Go to Dark Settlement Arresting Bad Man When Friends Attempt Rescue, Overpowering Deputies.

DUMAS, Ark., Jan. 22.—Race rioting at Burnis Mills is believed under control following the arrival of federal troops from Camp Pike. The troops went to the scene of the rioting where enraged blacks overpowered three deputy sheriffs, and took from them Jack Hayes, a negro, whom they arrested on the charge of stealing a mule.

Fire on Officials

DUMAS, Ark., Jan. 22.—Federal troops from Camp Pike were enroute here this morning to attempt to quell race rioting. The trouble started when deputy sheriffs went to the negro settlement to arrest a "bad black." They procured the man and a score of his friends attempted a rescue, firing on the officials. There were no casualties.

In response to the appeal, 125 soldiers were ordered to entrain immediately at Camp Pike.

MRS. CARRIE PAMBURN IS PNEUMONIA VICTIM

Mrs. Carrie Pamburn, wife of Roy Pamburn, railroad man of this city, died yesterday at 5 o'clock at St. Anthony's hospital. She had been seriously ill since Saturday and her death was due to influenza-pneumonia.

Mrs. Pamburn was 34 years of age and was born near Thornbollow in 1886, later moving to Athens with her parents. She is survived, besides her husband, by three children, Peter, aged 10, Vera, aged 12, and Everett, aged 13. Her mother, Mrs. Julia Watson, of Craig, Montana, survives her, as do the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. John Barnes and Mrs. Mary Brown, of this city; Mrs. Cora Billings of Walla Walla; Mrs. Lida Ross of Weston; Mrs. Annie Gray and Mrs. Eva Picard and Miss Regina McHain, of Gibbon; Miss Marie Reed of Thornbollow; Ralph McHain of Gibbon; William McHain of Adams; Joseph McHain of Pendleton; Moses McHain of Gibbon and Daniel McHain of Anacostia, Montana.

Mrs. Pamburn was a member of the Catholic church and the funeral services will be under the auspices of that church. No date has yet been set for the services. All the brothers and sisters will be here for the funeral but Mrs. Watson, mother of the deceased, is ill and will be unable to attend.

FIRE FIGHTER REACHES OWN HOME TOO LATE TO SAVE AGED MOTHER

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Lieutenant Dallage of the fire department, answered an alarm at his own home early today. A three-story brick building was filled with smoke when he arrived. The fireman rushed to the second floor, knocked in the door and found his aged mother lying on the floor unconscious. Dallage carried her through the fire and smoke to the street, but she could not stand the shock and died enroute to the hospital.

TO REFER KAISER'S CASE

PARIS, Jan. 22.—A member of the Dutch legation here today said the question of extradition of the former kaiser will be submitted to a referendum.
