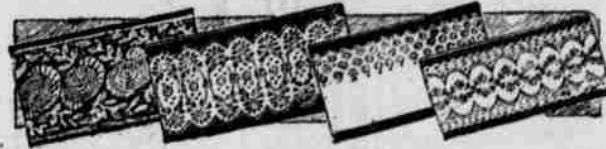

Martin Jones, dancing instructor, has opened dancing classes at Liberty Hall for Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons and evenings. Mr. Jones gives instruction in Walla Walla during the remainder of the week.

Farm Bureau News Issued.
The fifth number of the Farm Bureau News is being mailed today from the office of Fred Bennion, county agriculture agent. The News contains items of interest to the farmers and is mailed free of charge to Umatilla county farmers.

Clothing Experts Coming.
Experts in the making of hats and other clothing will be in Pendleton from G. A. C., some time in March to give instruction to all women who are interested, states Miss Ella May Harmon, county demonstration agent. Each expert will give a day's instruction in Pendleton.

Council Approves two Permits.
The city council last night approved two applications for building permits within the fire limits. One was to Otto Hohbach to remodel the interior of his store on East Court street, the cost to be \$600, and the other was to Clark H. Dunlap to raze the old K. of P. building at Main and Water streets.

Mrs. Bishop Elected
Mrs. Roy T. Bishop, formerly of Pendleton, now residing in Portland, was elected to membership on the board of directors of the Portland Y. W. C. A. at the annual meeting held recently in Portland. Mrs. Bishop is active in the campaign for funds for the University of Oregon Women's Building.

Lost Relatives Sought
Chief of Police A. L. Roberts today received two more requests from relatives of men thought to be in this vicinity who have not been heard from by their people. One man is named Ritzle and his daughter in Lewiston, Idaho, seeks him. The other is named William Forrest Shumate and Mrs. F. C. Hillyer, Atlanta, Ga., has news of a business nature for him.

Don't Like Sweeping System.
Considerable complaint is heard from Pendleton people regarding the present street sweeping system. The dust and dirt, says citizens are blown about and left on sidewalks and in buildings. The system is used as a substitute for the street flushing, which is said to be impossible when the temperature is at the freezing point.

Asks to Be Notified.
Dr. F. W. Vincent, of the Pacific Power and Light Company, reports that Pendleton people have fallen into the habit of telephoning Mayor Vaughan or members of the city council when arc lamps become out of order. Dr. Vincent says that better service can be secured if local citizens will call the company so that repairs can be made. There are some 400 arc lamps in the city, he states, and it is impossible to personally supervise each lamp, but if notified, the company will make repairs at once.

City Engineer Moves Office.
City Engineer Frank B. Hayes today moved his drafting room and office from the top floor of the city hall to the room on the main floor formerly occupied by the government employment office, just to the right of the entrance. The new location will save many steps up and down two flights of stairs and allow Mr. Hayes to keep in closer touch with the water office as well. The room has recently been used by the police department as a store place for captured stills and gambling paraphernalia. Request will be made by Mr. Hayes for an archway to be opened between his new office and the water office.

Serving Hot Lunches.
Between 85 and 90 children are fed daily with a hot lunch at the Umatilla school through the efforts of the women who are members of the Home Bureau of Umatilla. Miss Ella May Harmon, county demonstration agent, visited the school recently and is enthusiastic regarding the work done by the bureau. The bureau pays for the services of a cook while the school board has paid for the equipment, which includes a range and running water. Each child pays 4 cents for lunch, which pays for the cost of materials. The inauguration of the hot lunch system was accomplished by the bureau in just six weeks' time.

Community Organization Meetings.
Community organization meetings have been scheduled in the Farm Bureau calendar as follows: Pendleton, January 24, in library at 2 p. m.; Athena, January 26, in high school, at 2:30 p. m.; Freewater, January 27, in Commercial Club, at 1:30 p. m.; Hix, January 28, at 2:30 p. m. A county organization meeting will be held in this city in the library on Friday, January 30. Other events of interest to Umatilla county farmers will be a tractor and combine school to be held in this city at the high school, February 4, 5 and 6; a grain and potato production and marketing school, to be held in the Weston community hall February 13 and 14, and a silv tour in Echo, Stantfield and Hermiston sections February 24. A steer feeding school will be held at the Union experiment station sometime in March and dates will be announced later.
