William Desmond has played humorous cow-punchers, dare-devil adventurers and whimsical characters before, but he has never appeared quite so funny as he does in "Dangerous Waters," his latest production distributed by Exhibitors Mutual. It was made by Jesse D. Hampton for Robertson-Cole.

In this picture the genial Bill depicts himself as Vulcan, the god of thunder and patron of ironworks, hammer-throaters and other irate humanity. Clad in an abbreviated costume of chain-mail and accompanied by his pal, Dinky O'Moore, who is cast as our old friend Bacchus, god of booze and the grape, Desmond attends a banquet of the gods and goddesses on Mount Olympus (Ritz-Carlton, New York City).

"Vulcan" and "Bacchus" live up to their names. "Bacchus" acquires a beautiful lun by imbibing too much "nectar," and "Vulcan" uses his mallet and hammer on the skull of "Adonis," who gets too gay with "Venus." This is the aftermath of the orgy, but Desmond proves he's a genuine "Vulcan" by knocking the overbearing far out of "Adonis" who is a social sybarite in disguise trying to lure away "Venus," who happens to be "Vulcan's" sweetheart.

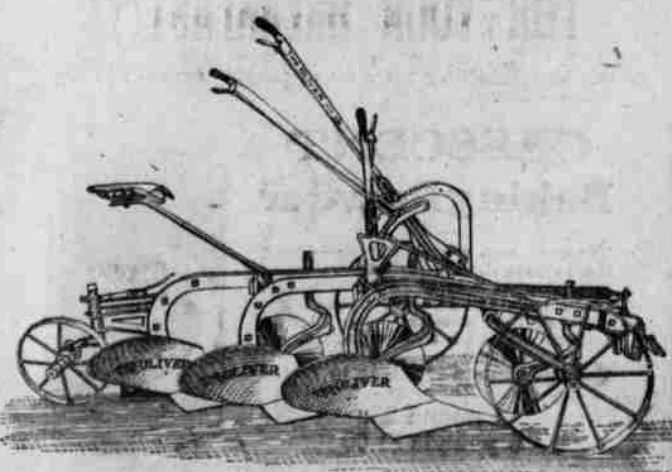
