

QUARANTINE IS STATE'S ORDER FOR INFLUENZA

Mayor and City Physician Join to Rigidly Enforce Ordinance Before Disease, Now Spreading, Causes Alarm.

NO GENERAL SHUT-DOWN CONSIDERED NECESSARY

Illness Greatly Decreases Attendance at School and Some Rooms are Closed as Precautionary Move.

Orders received from the state board of health this morning to quarantine all cases of influenza found in the city will be strictly enforced, Mayor J. L. Vaughan announced today. Following receipt of the orders, the mayor and Dr. H. J. Kavanaugh, city physician, had a conference in which plans were made for combating further spread of the disease.

City ordinance No. 1949, passed on Nov. 29, 1918, will be rigidly enforced. This provides for the quarantining of all cases of Spanish influenza as well as other contagious diseases and provides the same penalty for violation as for breaking quarantine from smallpox, scarlet fever, etc.

Not Serious But Spreading. Although there are considerably more cases of influenza reported in the city today, there are no serious developments as yet, the physicians say. The disease is appearing in milder form than last year and is not producing the congested condition of the lungs, which in many cases developed pneumonia. They point out, however, that in spite of the fact that the epidemic is not so severe, extreme precautions should be taken by all persons suffering from colds.

All physicians were issued instructions today to exercise their power of quarantine against any cases of influenza which they attend. This authority is given them by the city ordinance. In addition, the police department is enforcing the quarantine with two officers, John Bailey, Jr., and William Lyday.

No General Shutdown. So long as individuals observe the quarantine rule there will be no general shutdown in the city, Mayor Vaughan said today. He declared, however, that precautions must be taken to prevent a spread of the disease. It is possible that sheep dip may again be used on the streets as a preventive measure. This proved successful last winter when finally tried.

Illness in the city schools caused a large percentage of absences today. City Superintendent F. P. Austin reported. There are seven teachers absent from the grades today and two rooms had to be closed because not enough substitutes are available. Most of the teachers absent are from Hawthorne school.

Some of the rooms are also thinned out considerably by illness among the students. One room had 14 missing today some of them, however, being kept at home owing to a quarantine placed against some other member of the family.

Will Watch Schools. Because of its being the last day of the week, Supt. Austin did not deem it necessary to close the buildings. It may be found necessary later to take such steps, he said, if there is a continuance of the present condition.

Relief is expressed by some of the physicians that the conditions of a year ago will not return, inasmuch as the symptoms in most cases thus far have been slightly different. Very little pneumonia is predicted from the influenza as many have already recovered from what used to be known as the grip.

RED CROSS OUTLINES CARE FOR LA GRIPPE PATIENTS

In response to many requests received at the local Red Cross office, suggestions for the care of influenza or la grippe patients have been issued by the office. The Red Cross emphasizes the fact that while there is little cause for alarm that an epidemic will occur in Pendleton, the instructions are given in the hope of aiding in case of sickness.

Following are the instructions for the care of patients:

Call a doctor. If no doctor is available, follow these suggestions for treatment.

Patient should be put to bed in a room alone, with plenty of fresh air and no draughts.

Hot tub bath to induce perspiration before going to bed unless patient is weak.

Liquid diet such as egg nog, cocoa, milk soup, milk, lemonade, weak tea and coffee, broth every two hours.

Water Recommended

Give water freely—1 glassful every hour.

Give cathartic, 1 tablespoonful castor oil or 1 or 2 tablespoonfuls epsom salts. If bowels do not move well in

"GUILTY AS CHARGED" IS VERDICT AGAINST WILDER FOR KILLING M'NEECE

Guilty as charged was the verdict returned against Wallace W. Wilder by the jury which reported its verdict shortly after 10 o'clock last night. Wilder, charged with the shooting of Bert M'Neece at Freewater, September 14, 1919, will be sentenced tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The sentence for second degree murder in life imprisonment.

Appeal will be taken to the state supreme court, Attorney Will M. Peterson announced after the verdict was returned. He did not say upon what exceptions he would base appeal.

GOVERNOR'S VETO WONT BLOCK NAVAL BASE AT ASTORIA

Though Resentful Over Veto Astoria People Say Means Will be Found of Providing Funds for Buying Site.

ASTORIA, O., Jan. 22.—Astoria naval base plans received a setback through the action of Governor Olcott who Thursday night affixed his veto to the measure introduced at the special session of the Oregon legislature last week by Senator Norblad, which measure passed both the senate and house, the bill giving the port of Astoria authority to sell bonds to the extent of 15 per cent of the total assessable property within the district for the purpose of raising money with which to purchase for \$100,000 the Tongue point site for a naval base, to be presented free to the government for that purpose.

The news of the action taken by Governor Olcott was received with surprise and chagrin by those who have been active in securing the passage of the Senate Bill No. 18, introduced by Senator Norblad, and the veto of the measure was the topic of conversation throughout the city.

Nobody was more surprised by the news that the bill was vetoed than was Senator Norblad who put the bill through the legislature.

"It is a great blow to Astoria," said Senator Norblad, "and I cannot agree with the reasons expressed by the governor for vetoing the measure. The least that he might have done was to consult the author of the bill and find out if an emergency really did exist. He did not do so. The emergency clause was attached to the bill for the reason that an emergency does exist. Other Oregon ports were consulted and their representatives agreed that the port of Astoria bill was all right. Dr. Alfred Kinney, one of the commissioners, said: 'Apparently the governor had other reasons than the facts in the case for vetoing the bill. Or else he has taken somebody else's word for the effect that the bill will have on other ports; or else, he has never read the port of Astoria bill. It looks like other interests in the state had brought pressure to bear on the governor and asked that our bill be vetoed. But we are not going to cry over spilled milk. The blow is not a serious one to Astoria for other means of acquiring the naval base site will be found.'

No other one town can keep us down nor prevent us from becoming a great seaport city. No blow can Astoria now. I might add that wheat for export will be worth more than 30 cents a ton in the Astoria terminals than in Portland terminals, too. Shipping is going to give us the benefits we deserve and are going to have."

INFLATED ORDERS TO BE CUT IN FIGHT ON HIGH CLOTHING PRICE

For profuse perspiration, rub patient dry with towels and change clothing. Do not expose the patient.

For headache apply cold compresses or ice bag on head.

Patient should not be allowed to sit up more than 10 or 15 minutes. The first few times increase the time gradually and watch patient for signs of weakness.

MUST REMAIN IN BED

Patient should not be allowed out of bed for any reason until temperature has been normal for 48 hours or as doctor orders.

PASSENGERS OF BOAT POWHATAN PASS TO SAFETY

Transfer From Disabled Army Transport, in Distress Since Sunday, Made Successfully to Northern Pacific.

271 HAVE WAITED ON STORM TOSSED VESSEL

All Are Resting Comfortably After Thrilling Escape When Seas Moderate and Rescue is Finally Effectuated.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Two hundred seventy-one passengers of the disabled army transport Powhatan, which has been in distress off Halifax since Sunday are comfortably resting in the best quarters of the transport Northern Pacific, following a thrilling transfer late yesterday. The passengers had been without heat or warm food since Sunday.

Trouble Still Looms.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—A wireless message from Captain Randall of the disabled transport Powhatan this afternoon indicated that further trouble may be expected unless the vessel is towed with heavier gear than that being used and sent to her aid. The message was sent following the transfer of 271 passengers to the transport Northern Pacific late last night.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The Canadian steamer Lady Langley was towing the disabled transport Powhatan into Halifax after the transfer of the passengers. The steamer Western Comet, after towing the Powhatan, had trouble with its towline and the Lady Langley had to take up the work.

Transfer Passengers

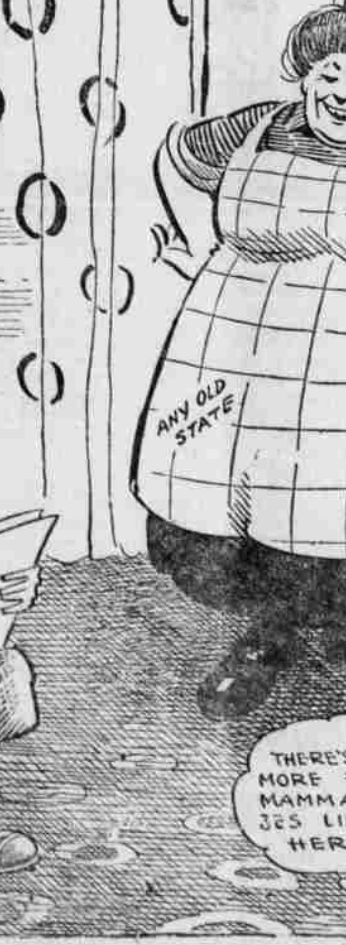
NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—A wireless message received here from Captain Randall of the disabled transport Powhatan in the afternoon said everything was "O.K." An attempt to transfer passengers would be made later in the day if the seas moderated, according to the message.

Seas Moderate.

BOSTON, Jan. 22.—With the destroyers Shark and Oglivy and the steamer Northern Pacific and Western Comet standing by, an attempt was made to transfer passengers from the disabled army transport Powhatan to the Northern Pacific, according to a radio message intercepted at the Charlestown navy yard.

Heavy seas which were running yesterday and last night have abated somewhat, and an attempt was being planned to establish a towline with the Western Comet.

H. A. Barrett, of Athena, is Elected Vice President of Association at Annual Meeting in Walla Walla.

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 22.—The Wenaha Wool Growers' association, at its annual meeting here Thursday, elected H. A. Barrett, Athena, Vice President; Elmer Bryson, Walla Walla, secretary; James Grant, Walla Walla, treasurer.

The growers took up the question of shears. Charges were made that the shearers were in a powerful union and that they were careless in their work and their wages were high. It is probable that this question will be discussed before the State Wool Growers' association, which will meet this morning.

HOOVER BELONGED TO G. O. P. CLUB UNTIL 1917

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Herbert Hoover is back in Washington today after a flying trip to New York which has added little, so far, to any public announcement concerning his position regarding the presidential nomination. The New York Sun published an article stating records of the Republican Club of New York show Hoover a member of the club and that he paid dues from 1909 to 1917. He resigned from the club in June 1917, three months after his appointment as federal food administrator.

BORAH-JOHNSON GROUP HALTS NEGOTIATIONS IN BI-PARTISAN SESSIONS

Insurrection Follows Rumor That Republican Leader is Surrendering and Hot Finish Fight is Threatened.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Insurrection against Senator Lodge, started by the Borah-Johnson group of treaty opponents, today brought the treaty negotiations to a temporary halt. Today's sessions of the bi-partisan conference were called off to give Lodge a chance to convince the insurgents he is not surrendering to the democrats.

Reports that a treaty compromise was about to be reached in the bi-partisan conference in Lodge's office aroused the Borah-Johnson group of senators to a high pitch of indignation against Lodge. They declared they notified Lodge that if he "betrays" them by agreeing to the compromise now proposed they will refuse to recognize him as party leader, and will carry the battle into the republican primaries and national convention, fighting Lodge all the way.

TURK LEADERS RESIGN, CABINET MAY FOLLOW

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 22.—The minister of war and chief of the general staff of Turkey today resigned. Resignation of the entire cabinet is now expected.

THREE PAY WITH LIVES FOR FARMER'S MURDER

MONTREAL, Jan. 22.—J. B. Lemay, Murdoch Allan and Romeo Lacoste were hanged early today for the murder of Abide Fayette, a farmer whose house they tried to rob, August 15, 1917.

COMPTON IS NAMED PENITENTIARY WARDEN

SALEM, Jan. 22.—L. H. Compton, state parole officer, was appointed today warden of the penitentiary by Governor Olcott and he will take up his duties about February 1. Dr. Steiner who has been warden since Stevens resigned in May, will return to the superintendency of the asylum. Percy Varney, former chief of police here, was appointed parole officer.

VESSEL TRAPPED IN ICE OFF CHICAGO FOR LAST 48 HOURS

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—The steamer Sidney Jeff, with a crew of eight, is still locked in the ice off Chicago harbor. The vessel is bound from Michigan City to Chicago and has been fast in the ice for 48 hours. It is feared that supplies of food and fuel are exhausted. All efforts of tug to reach the vessel have been futile. Two men left the ship and tried to walk ashore across the ice but were forced to turn back. The only hope of freeing the vessel is for the wind to shift and break up the ice pack.
