LET THE RULE WORK BOTH WAYS

If the Thurtell recommendation in the Columbia rate case means that the interstate commerce commission is going to make distance the basis of rate adjustment then Pendleton should be in line to secure considerable distributing business now handled through the coast terminal cities. Portland is 231 miles farther from the east and middle west than is Pendleton. Why should the Rose city then be allowed a transcontinental freight rate as low as Pendleton on many important lines of manufactured products. It is a poor rule that does not work both ways. Portland has been talking fervently for "natural rates" from the inland empire down the Columbia. Let the metropolis join also in a move to do away with the unnatural rate arrangement that penalizes the interior on transcontinental shipments. If Portland is sincere in this matter it will abandon its old terminal rate contention and join in pressing the fight long waged by Spokane.

Is Portland ready to do this?

BLOCKING AIR PROGRESS

There are signs of a revolt in the house of representatives against Leader Mondell's action in denying \$3,000,000 for extension of the air mail service.

Postmaster General Burleson asked for \$3,000,000 for aerial mail service. He reviewed the successes already had and insisted that if given the additional \$3,000,000 he would effect actual money savings of more than this amount. He showed that in the service now existing between New York and Washington, and New York and Chicago, sufficient money had been saved to pay the total expense.

Mr. Burleson proposed that four additional lines should be started at once, one of which would connect up Pittsburg, Columbus, Indianapolis and St. Louis and eventually would have provided for extension into New York, a very little later once the main line between Pittsburg and St. Louis was established. Through these lines, it would have been possible to put Indiana business in very close touch with the East, because the mail time would have been reduced by one-half at least.

The house committee brought in a proposal that only \$850,500 should be appropriated but the moment consideration was given on the floor, it was seen amendments would be offered to provide at least \$2,000,000 and probably the \$3,000,000 requested by the postmaster general. Sentiment in the house was overwhelmingly in support of the increased appropriations.

The move, however, was blocked by a point of order to which Mondell gave his support.

"I have been proud of my membership in this house but I look with shame upon the sentiments expressed here today," said Representative Tilson of Connecticut, prominent in republican councils. "The action taken here today not only denies development of the mail service but also denies the opportunity for development of the airplane industry in this country."

It was further claimed by critics of the house leader that his action could not have been prompted by a desire for economy for the reason that the bill reported by the republican house committee carried an appropriation of \$70,000,000 more than had been asked for by the postmaster general.

AN OVERSEAS DIARY

(By Rev. J. E. Cornelson who served with the Y. M. C. A. overseas.)

Monday, September 5th—The rain has been continuous. The saying in this part of France I have found true, namely, that it rains 30 days each month except February, when it can only get in 25 days. However, we do not stop for the rain, for we have secured a good supply of things from the quartermaster and so have been rushing it out to every canteen so the men may be well supplied during this wet period. The division is billeted in about ten towns about here ranging from two to eight miles distance from Doullens. The Fords are doing the distributing while the trucks unload the cars.

Green Corn, Tomato and Cheese.

1 tablespoon of butter, 2 cups of grated cheese, 3-4 cup of canned or grated fresh corn, 1 ripe plumato, 1-2 cup of tomato puree, 2 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon of paprika, 1 clove of garlic, 4 slices of bread.

Into the melted butter stir the cheese until it, too, has melted. Then add the corn and plumato, stir for a moment and add the egg yolks beaten and mixed with the tomato juice and the salt and paprika. Have ready the bread toasted on one side and very lightly rubbed on its untoasted side with the garlic cut in two. Pour the mixture over the untoasted side of the bread and serve at once. A poached egg is sometimes placed on top of each portion, making a very nutritious combination.

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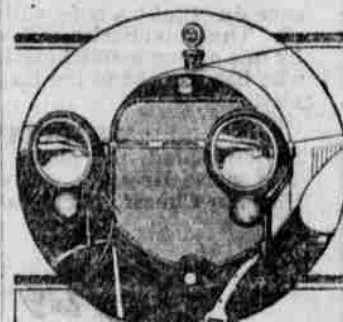
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
