U. S. RADIOS MAY SEND PRESS REPORTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Government-owned wireless stations on the Pacific coast, in Hawaii and the Philippines, would be permitted to transmit press dispatches at any rate fixed by the navy department, under a bill introduced today by Representative White, republican, Maine, chairman of the house merchant marine subcommittee engaged in framing radio legislation. Commercial messages also might be handled by the navy's trans-Pacific wireless, but the bill would be fixed the same as charged by private wireless companies under the bill.

CRY FOR ECONOMY BECOMES LOUDER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Leaders in both houses of congress are becoming more insistent in their demands for economy. Senator Smoot, member of the appropriations committee, today said economy is a necessity if the government is going to make both ends meet. He suggested in an interview that a special committee of technical experts be put solely at the command of congress, directed to go into every governmental department and search for ways to economize.

"We have been counting on continuation of a big excess profits return, but business concerns are not making what they were during the war," said Smoot. "Those excess profits taxes are not going to keep up and I think you will see quite a drop."

PORTLAND JANITOR FALLS FROM HIGH LEDGE; DIES

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—William Van Valenburgh, janitor at the Wickwicksam apartments, was mortally injured yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock as the result of a five-story fall sustained while he was washing windows at the apartment house. He died about an hour later at St. Vincent's hospital from an internal hemorrhage.

Mr. Van Valenburgh, who was 53 years of age, was washing windows on the north side of the building at the time of the accident. The fall resulted from his losing his grip on the window frame. He suffered a fracture of the leg and arm and several broken ribs in addition to internal injuries.

Mr. Van Valenburgh, who was married, is survived by his wife, Mrs. May Van Valenburgh, and three grown sons. The body was turned over to Deputy Coroner Goetsch.
