AMICABLE SETTLEMENT OF JAPANESE QUESTION NOW APPEARS PROBABLE

**Anti-Asiatic Sentiment in Hood
River Section Is Met by Propo-
sals That Will Check
Power of Foreigners.**

HOOD RIVER, Jan. 23.—With the calling of a special meeting of the Anti-Asiatic association for next Thursday night, there is a good prospect of the local trouble between whites and Japanese of this section being settled in an amicable manner.

For several days two residents have been cooperating in an effort to bring the whites and Japanese in line for a settlement of the problem, with the result that the leaders of the Japanese ranchers have now made the fol-

lowing proposals:

That resident Japanese will not permit others of their nationality to settle here.

That no further attempts will be made to purchase land in this valley.

That Japanese owners of land here will make every effort in their power to bring the standard of their ranch homes up to that of their neighbors.

These proposals practically embody all that the anti-Japanese association set out to secure, and the adoption of these proposals will undoubtedly be advocated by a large section of the members of the association.

Shortly after the trouble started in this valley, the attitude of many of the whites toward the Japanese neighbors underwent a radical change, and the Japanese, ever sensitive, have been seeking to establish the former good relations with their neighbors.

While there is a small element which is opposed to compromise in any form, the great majority of the white ranchers and others will be quite satisfied to call the local agitation finished if the Japanese are prepared to give their pledge to abide by an agreement as that outlined by the leader of the Japanese.

GUILT FOR THROTTLING PEACE TREATY PLACED ON G. O. P. LEADERSHIP

**Chairman Cummings Declares
America, With Democratic
Congress Would Have Been
First Nation to Ratify.**

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 23.—America would have been the first nation to ratify the treaty of peace had a democratic house and senate been elected in 1918, Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the democratic national committee, declared in an address Tuesday at Governor Edward's inaugural dinner.

"Not only has republican leadership throttled the treaty of peace," he said "but after months of debate it cannot point to a single constructive measure that it has enacted into law."

The republican party is bankrupt of leadership, Mr. Cummings declared, and cannot agree on a policy satisfactory even to itself. "The impoverished mental status of their policy-makers is shown by the fact," he said, "that their national committee has found it necessary to offer a reward of \$10,000 to any young man, preferably under the age of 25 years who can write a winning platform for the republican party."

Only the adolescent would undertake such a task he added.

Party Stands on Record
"There will be no difficulty in writing a democratic platform," the speaker continued. "It is not necessary for us to engineer our policy with a view to pleasing particular groups or so to conduct ourselves as to develop racial animosity. We stand today upon a record of achievement unparalleled in American history. We have sought domestic reforms which have long been denied our people, and during the war our successes won the admiration of the world."

"This republican congress has contented itself with conducting a campaign of baseless criticism, and slander against the president of the United States, in the repudiation of our international obligations and the abandonment of the allies in whose company only a few months ago we were fighting to save the civilization of the world."

Indictment Sweeping One.
"All processes of government have been impaired. The work of reconstruction has been delayed, the business of the country has been throttled, the peace of the world has been postponed, and rude and unskillful hands have been thrust amid the interlacing strands of human destiny."

According to the police report, Heaton and Davis encountered Thompson in the course of their revels. Thereupon it is said, they challenged him to fistic combat. In the ensuing exchange of blows the students took more than they gave, the hospital record shows.

The combatants were separated by Patrolman R. O. Griffin, who took a hand in the fight, to the discomfort of all.

After the battle the participants were removed to the Central Emergency hospital for treatment and later were jailed for drunkenness and disturbing the peace.

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**FINANCE CONGRESS
IN CLOSING DAYS**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The Pan American Financial Conference held its closing session here today.

Chairman John Barton Payne of the Shipping board, speaking on "Improvement of Ocean and Land Transportation Facilities," outlined the board's policy on its South American steamer passenger service.

Tomorrow Latin American delegates will be taken on a visit to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, and to the Hog Island shipyards.

Monday, each delegation will start on a separate tour of the country as guests of leading American business men. Their tour will include visits to coal and iron fields, cotton districts, railroad centers, steel plants, and fruit and grain growing sections.

WILSON'S MALADY LAID TO MYSTERIOUS POISON OF BALKAN BLACKHAND

PARIS, Jan. 23.—The newspaper L'Eclair of Nice today advances an entirely new "cause" of President Wilson's illness. The malady, according to the newspaper, was caused by a mysterious poison administered by a Balkan blackhand last June. Similar attempts were made against premier Nitti, of Italy, and Trumbitch head of the Junco-Ray peace delegation, which failed, the newspaper said.

WROTE FICTITIOUS LETTER FOR WIFE TO DISCOVER

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 23.—Dr. William J. McMillan, a dentist, appearing before Judge Everett Smith Thursday as plaintiff in a divorce suit testified that on one occasion he wrote himself a fictitious letter purporting to come from a feminine admirer and left the letter carelessly in his pocket, where his wife found it.

"She was always going through my pockets," he explained "looking for incriminating letters. I thought I would let her find something. However, afterwards, when I explained, she was not inclined to believe it was a joke."

Interfered at Office.
Dr. McMillan declared that when he opened offices in Portland his wife was a constant visitor during business hours and interfered with the treatment of patients.

Mrs. McMillan contested the case, but filed no cross-complaint. She sought to have the suit dismissed and did not want a divorce. She testified that her husband had used his office for wild parties.

Decree Brings Hysterics.
Judge Smith granted Dr. McMillan a divorce on the ground of personal indignities.

When the court's ruling was announced Mrs. McMillan became hysterical and required medical aid.

PLACARDS ADVERTISING BOOZE MUST DISAPPEAR

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 23.—Frank Silva, prohibition enforcement officer, for the western division, warned today that unless signs and placards advertising liquor disappear immediately, the owners of premises where such signs are displayed will be liable to prosecution.

He said, "All signs advertising intoxicating beverages are unlawful, and must disappear immediately or prosecution for violations of the eighteenth amendment will follow."

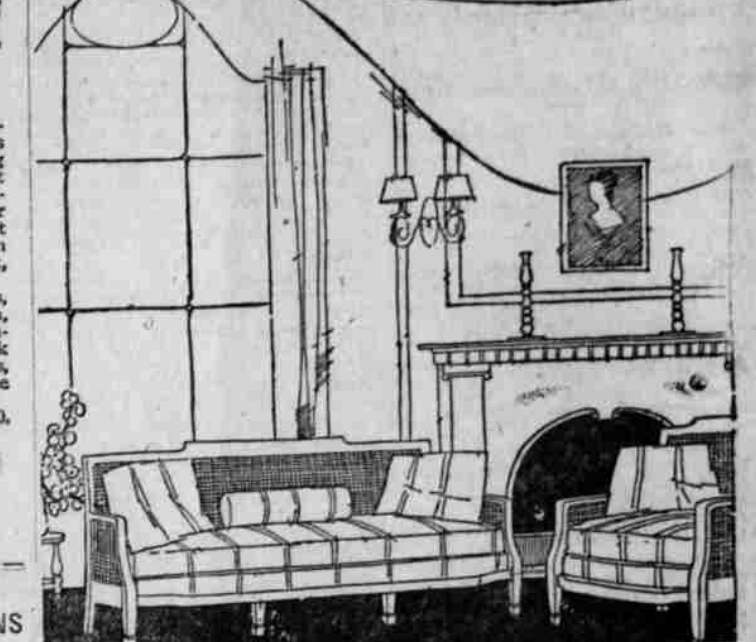
DAMMIT—HE'S DEAD; ALL COLLEGE MOURNS
