Wilder Given His Sentence

Wallace W. Wilder received sentence late Friday afternoon instead of at 10 o'clock this morning, Judge G. W. Phelps having at that time had other criminal matters to pass upon. The man adjudged guilty of the murder of Bert W. H. McNeese appeared in court room and heard the life sentence pronounced. Pending the hearing of his appeal to the supreme court, Wilder must go to Salem and commence serving his sentence.

Seed Wheat Cases Set.

The three seed wheat cases against the Farmers Union Grain Agency, in which damages totalling \$25,000 are asked, has been set for trial before a circuit court jury on February 5. In the interim, the jury is adjourned. In case the influenza situation clears up prior to that time, some other lesser cases will be called for trial before a jury selected of Pendleton men. Judge G. W. Phelps said today.

Jackson's Sentence Postponed

Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps yesterday afternoon stayed passing sentence on Leonard Jackson, recently found guilty of the theft of a bicycle, when his attorney, A. A. Bynon, declared to the judge that his client has additional proof that he believes will establish his innocence. Jackson was arrested at Walla Walla last fall when he sold a bicycle alleged to have been stolen at Preswater. Jackson told his attorney that he could name the man from whom he declares he bought the stolen wheel. The judge granted the stay of sentence on the ground that he would not send an innocent man to the penitentiary.

Pleads Guilty to Larceny.

Harry Manger, one of four men recently arrested at Echo charged with the theft of some grain and a pair of chaps and later indicted by the grand jury, yesterday afternoon waived time in which to enter plea and pleaded guilty to a charge of simple larceny. He was fined \$100 and \$48.50 costs, in lieu of which he is to serve in the county jail at the rate of \$2 for every day. The other three arrested with him were exonerated of blame and the cases against them dismissed.

Salary Schedule Committee Meets.

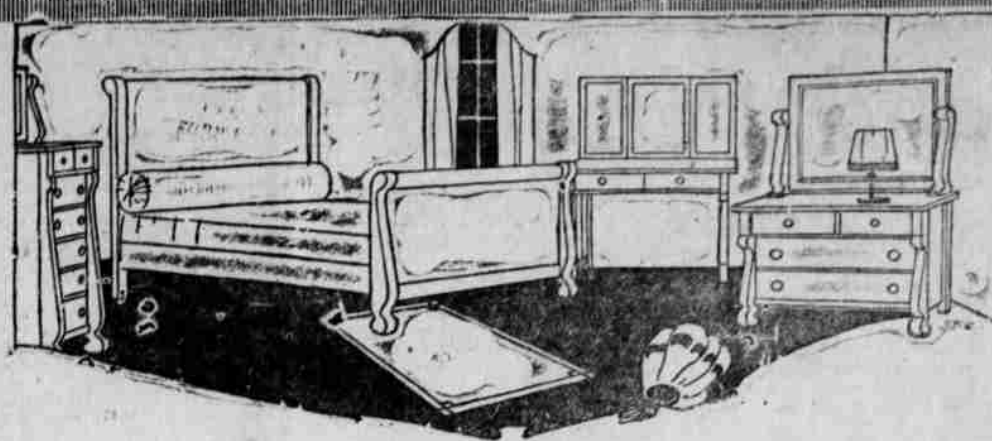

36 OREGON FIGHTERS WIN SERVICE CROSS

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—Less than 1 per cent of the American soldiers who saw service with the American army in France won the congressional medal of honor or the distinguished service cross, the military decorations bestowed by the American government for extraordinary heroism in action, according to word received here from Washington. The official figures are: Medal of honor, 78; distinguished service cross, 5241. There were 941 awards of the distinguished service medal, which is the decoration conferred by the government for conspicuous service in a position of great trust and responsibility. The record of awards has just been compiled by the Fasset Publishing company of Washington.

The army medal of honor was authorized by congress in 1862 and was first restricted for conferring upon privates and non-commissioned officers only for extraordinary gallant service in the civil war. Later both restrictions were removed. The other two decorations were provided by congress in the appropriation act of July 1918.

Of the boys in service from Oregon a total of 36 received the distinguished service cross, while none won the medal of honor. The awards of the cross, according to cities and towns in which the recipients live, was as follows: Portland, 15; Bandon, 1; Beaverton, 1; Bend, 1; Cottage Grove, 1; Creston, 1; Hillsdale, 1; Hood River, 1; Linnton, 1; McMinnville, 2; Milwaukie, 1; Newberg, 1; North Portland, 2; Preswater, 1; Salem, 3; Sherwood, 1; Walla, 1; Woodburn, 1.

On completing their work here Dr. Mahood and daughter will conduct a similar series of meetings at The Dalles.

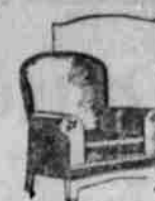

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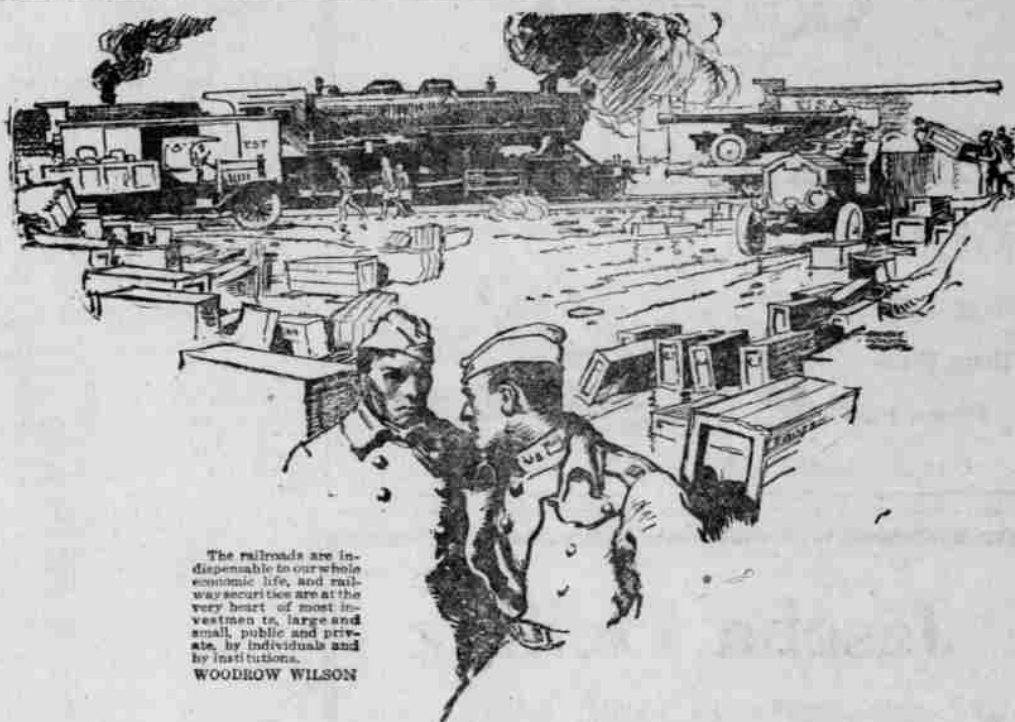

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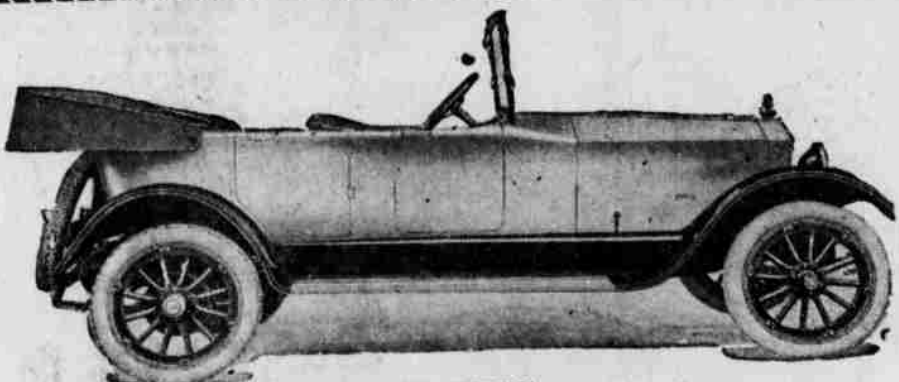
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
