John L. Brown Is Dead.

John L. Brown, aged 70, of Freewater, father of Frank, Will and Harvey Brown of Pendleton, died Saturday night in Freewater. His death occurred just three days after that of his wife, Mrs. Nancy Brown, who died last Wednesday at the age of 63. Mr. Brown is survived also by James Brown, who makes his home in Washington, and by Arthur Brown, of Freewater. Nine grandchildren and three great grandchildren survive. Funeral services were held today in Freewater.

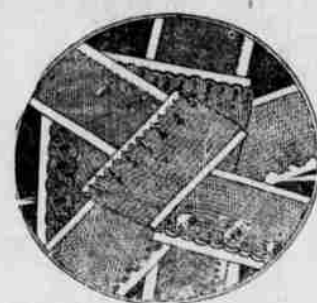

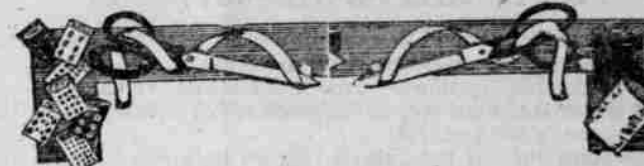

INDICTMENT OF "Y" HEADS ON FRAUD CHARGE IS SOUGHT

To a letter just received by the military editor of a local paper from an American soldier on the Rhine. The American army officials have fixed the price at twelve pennings a stein as a result of complaints of overcharging by "Wirtschaft" and "Gesthaus proprietors."

The rate for real Pilsener is forty pfennings. An American dollar is now worth four thousand pfennings, so it looks as if there will be little difficulty in finding recruits for the American army of occupation.

MOTION STARTS TEST OF CONSTITUTIONALITY OF DRY LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The government in the supreme court today moved to dismiss Rhode Island's bill attacking the validity of constitutional prohibition.

Argument on this motion is expected to determine whether constitutional prohibition will stand. The solicitor general said the motion could not be argued until March because Rhode Island attorneys are not ready. A recess of the court during February will delay it until that time, so a decision cannot be expected before April.

The court agreed to advance appeals from Ohio courts which will determine whether the state by referendum can override the action of a state legislature in ratifying the constitutional prohibition amendment.

Stenog Among the Romans. It is not generally known that stenography as a profession was followed as long ago as the days of the Roman empire. Poets who are sometimes ridiculed nowadays for having private stenographers, had them in the fourth century of our era.

SPOKANE, Jan. 26.—Indictments by the federal grand jury, in session here, of national heads of the Young Men's Christian Association on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses, and using the United States mails to defraud were sought in a communication received today by Foreman Slater of the jury.

The charges are based on the use of money collected from the people of the United States during the war for "advertising trust companies and insurance companies of the nation."
