WIDER RECOGNITION OF TRADE MARK IS TOPIC

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(United Press.)—Establishment of a system of laws, whereby copyrights on trade marks will be recognized in all countries in North and South America, will be advocated here today at the second Pan American Economic Conference.

At present copyrights of North American countries are not recognized in Latin American countries. According to an arrangement some time ago, it was agreed that when two thirds of the Latin American countries had ratified establishment of such laws, all the other countries would accept it. At present five Latin American nations—Brazil, Uruguay, Paraguay, Ecuador and Bolivia—have ratified the convention. Two more are necessary to make ratification effective. Peru has indicated its willingness to ratify but Argentina has proved the stumbling block. It is hoped to induce its delegates here to bring pressure to secure Argentine's approval.

International co-operation in commerce and finance was urged in a speech by John Bassett Moore, vice-chairman of the International High Commission, who spoke on "The Work of the International High Commission." The International High Commission is made up of delegates from all American Republics, including the United States and Mexico. It was organized in Buenos Aires in May, 1916, as a result of a trip there by William G. McAdoo, ex-secretary of the treasury. The finance ministers of all countries are members of the commission.

The conference, which is being held to "stimulate trade relations between North and South American countries," is being attended by the leading business men of all the countries represented. Means to restore Latin American exchanges to their normal levels are being taken up, as well as the matter of investing American capital in Latin American development.

HOUSE GRANTS PAY RISE FOR SAILORS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The house today passed a bill granting pay increases of from 20 to 50 per cent to enlisted men of the navy.

FROM COUNTY PAPERS

The Weston post of the American Legion is planning extensive alterations in the upstairs part of the city hall, which has been placed at the post's disposal by the council. The main hall, 75 by 35 in dimensions, will be fitted up as a ball room, athletic court and auditorium. Part of the floor is being renewed and the remainder will be repaired. A small stage for post stunts will be built in the east wall of the hall, which will be either re-papered or kalsomined. Club rooms will be fitted up in the annex which constitutes the eastern wing of the building.

Under a new arrangement a branch

of the Umatilla County Library is to be opened in the Pilot Rock Mercantile Co.'s store. The library is to be open only and a librarian will be in attendance.

Plowing was in progress January 17 at the Dr. Baddeley place on Weston mountain—an unusual activity at this season, the Weston Leader comments.

Work on the big Togi Irrigation Project south of Pilot Rock is going on apace, the record reports. Notwithstanding wintry weather work on the tunnel is progressing rapidly as the elements do not interfere in the big bore and the work on the main canal is not impeded by the frost as the big steam shovel goes ahead notwithstanding the frozen condition of the ground.

Era Haxon has received his appointment on the rural route west of Echo, according to the Stanfield Standard. He has been substitute for some time. The salary for carrier has been increased recently, and is now \$1920 a year.

J. C. Pritchett and Sons of Free-water are building a new warehouse on the lot directly back of their present store. It is to be 50 by 98—corro-gated iron walls and cement floor and 20 feet high. It is well built and roomy to accommodate their growing hardware and farm machinery business. It will add another substantial improvement to the business interests of Free-water, the Times says.

The Big Tillamook ranch containing 305 acres that borders on and is partly in the north and west portions of the city of Hermiston, was sold last week in two divisions for the sum of \$52,000.

E. C. Burlingame, well known hay and fruit grower of the Gardena district (located in Milton recently) that he has \$25,000 worth of alfalfa hay lying on the Hilltop Ranch northwest of Free-water that that cannot be moved for lack of railway cars.

President Culley of the Weston Commercial Club has announced a committee consisting of Dr. P. D. Watts, S. A. Barnes and P. C. Fitzpatrick to handle arrangements for the grain and potato school to be held at Weston under the Farm Bureau auspices February 13 and 14. The publicity will be in charge of Clark Wood, J. H. Williams and E. O. DeMoss. The matter of securing a market road up Weston mountain was discussed at the meeting, it appearing that the prospects are quite favorable for such a highway.

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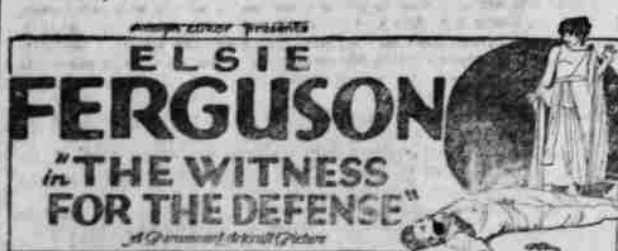
