

HUNGARY WILL NOT SIGN PACT AS IT STANDS

Count Apponyi, Head of Delegation to Leave for Paris Middle of Week Carrying Absolute Refusal.

GERMANY PROTESTS ON DEMAND FOR KAISER

Note Sent Today Urging Allies to Relieve Former Enemy of Clause Requiring Delivery of Accused.

BERLIN, Jan. 27.—Count Apponyi, head of the Hungarian peace delegation, will leave for Paris the middle of the week carrying an absolute refusal to sign the peace treaty in its present form, a Vienna dispatch today declared.

Ask Army of 60,000.
PARIS, Jan. 27.—The Hungarian government today asked the peace conference to modify the treaty to permit a minimum army of 60,000 instead of 20,000 as proposed. It is learned, due to the Bolshevik menace.

Germany Protests.
PARIS, Jan. 27.—Germany today sent a note to the peace conference urging the allies to relieve her from execution of the clause of the Versailles treaty requiring Germany to deliver persons accused of war crimes. It is learned.

GREATEST LEGAL FIGHT LOOMS ON PROHIBITION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The greatest legal drive against any law or any part of the constitution in the history of the country appears to be looming up in the many attacks being made or prepared against constitutional prohibition. Government attorneys estimate it will be two years before it will be known definitely whether constitutional prohibition stands upon a firm legal foundation, but they hold out little hope for any "lifting of the lid" during that time.

The body is at Brown's undertaking parlors awaiting funeral arrangements.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 2 p. m. from the Brown chapel, Rev. J. Francis Morgan, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will officiate.

AUTHORITY FOR ORDERING VACCINATION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN IS DISPUTED

Objection to the edict of the State Board of Health making vaccination of school children compulsory in all communities was voiced today by James S. Johns, Mr. Johns, speaking for a number of families in the city, presented a communication recently printed in a Coos Bay paper, showing that the matter of vaccination is optional with local school boards. The edict as received by the Pendleton board says that the State Board of Health demands the action.

The Marshfield communication is as follows:

Editor Coos Bay Times:
In your issue of January 6th it is asserted that school authorities in Marshfield are to compel all school children to be vaccinated. The Oregon statute (Section 27, Chapter 254) pertaining to vaccination of school children reads as follows:

"Any board of school directors may, on account of the prevalence of any communicable disease, or to prevent the spread of such communicable disease, prohibit the attendance of any teacher or pupil upon any school under their control, and may specify the time during which such teacher or pupil shall remain away from such school, and may prohibit the attendance of an unvaccinated child, who has not had the smallpox, upon the

ASKS 15 MILLION TO FEED "RED'S" VICTIMS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—President Wilson will recommend that Congress appropriate \$15,000,000 to feed the starving people of Poland and other states on the "Bolshevik frontier." This appropriation is urged by Hoover, General Bliss and others in close touch with the situation in that part of Europe.

The matter of making the appropriation is now before Congress. President Wilson is not expected to send a note to Congress but he will suggest to individual members that the appropriation be authorized.

Secretary Glass today appeared before the subcommittee of the house, urging Congress to rush a loan of \$150,000,000 to prevent actual starvation in Poland, Austria and Armenia.

SPOKANE, Jan. 27.—Appropriations of \$150,000,000 for the stricken peoples of Europe will have a tendency not only to stabilize Europe, but to open European markets to American food products, Senator Kendrick told the American National Livestock Association in convention here today. He is president of the organization.

"It is a fact, perhaps not sufficiently appreciated, that although our exports in 1919 amounted to almost 2,000,000,000 pounds, twice as much as sent abroad in 1915, they represented less than nine per cent of American beef production."

166 DIE OF FLU
CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—A new death record in the influenza epidemic here was established with the recording of 166 deaths in the past 24 hours.

In addition to the volunteers named yesterday the following have offered their services and are assigned: Friday, Mrs. W. E. Lowell, Miss Dorothy Fliegel, Miss Olive Roebuck; Saturday, Mrs. Frank Kincaid, Mrs. G. W. Phelps, Mrs. J. W. Maloney; Sunday, Mrs. Lee Moorhouse, Mrs. George Bickers.

The Northwestern Division of the American Red Cross is sending Miss Cunliffe from Seattle to assist the Umatilla chapter in the epidemic in response to an appeal from the chapter Sunday evening. Miss Cunliffe is expected to arrive on the afternoon train.

Miss Lela Cole has offered her services to the Red Cross and is calling at the homes where patients are most in need of care. By serving them on a visiting basis who is able to attend from six to eight cases a day.

Miss Shoda Walsh is still in Pilot Rock supervising the hospital there and medical nurses are giving Red Cross assistance in other parts of the county.

RED CROSS SEALS NET \$1,625 IN THIS COUNTY

The sum of \$1,625.95 was obtained in Umatilla county for the Oregon society for the prevention of tuberculosis, through the sale of Red Cross seals during the holiday season, according to a report completed today by Mrs. David M. Hill and Mrs. Earl Tullock, in charge of the campaign.

Umatilla far exceeded her quota, which was \$1250. The county is now next to Multnomah in the size of total sales of the Christmas seals.

Of the sum realized, \$224.25 was secured by the Flying Squadron, under the management of Guy Wyrick. The local schools sold seals amounting to \$117.72, and the street sales, under the management of Mrs. E. O. Parker, reached a total of \$284.98. Women's clubs of Pendleton were responsible for the sale of \$224.39. County towns for the sale of \$149.25 as the result of the sales.

PEACE TREATY MAY FACE OPEN SENATE DEBATE

Republican Reservationists Working Out Agreement With Democrats to Throw Pact Back for Compromise.

COALITION WAITS FOR BREAK IN CONFERENCE

Bi-Partisan Meeting Adjourns Without Expected Chasm Which 43 Democrats and 15 Republicans Expect.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Republican and reservationists have practically worked out an agreement with the Democrats to throw the treaty into an open debate in the senate in an effort to effect a compromise on the reservations which can obtain 64 votes for ratification.

This coalition will act as soon as the breaking off of the bi-partisan conference becomes a certainty. Democrats, according to the information, will send to Senator Lodge that they cannot accept his terms for continuation of conferences.

42 Will Join 15.
Mild reservationists have assurances that 43 Democrats will join with 15 Republicans to put the treaty again before the senate. The plan is to consider the reservations one by one, letting the senators submit whatever suggestions for compromise they wish.

DECISION IN LIBRARY CASE IS TODAY UPHELD

SALEM, Jan. 27.—The right of the Commercial Association of Pendleton to the proceeds from the \$5000 trust fund left by Samuel Sturges was upheld by the supreme court today. The right was contested by the Pendleton Library which alleged a misappropriation of the funds of the will.

The opinion of Justice Anderson's decree except that the opinion of the lower court was modified to eliminate the recovery of costs from the defendants and directs that the accumulated surplus of the trust fund be directed to the purposes of the library of the Pendleton Commercial Association.

REPLY TO NEW YORK QUERY BACKS HOOVER

W. W. Harrah, prominent farmer who is a member of the Agriculture Advisory Board, received a telegram today from the New York World asking his opinion of Herbert Hoover as a presidential candidate.

Mr. Harrah sent the following answer: "Telegram received. Service is needed; Hoover wanted. Summer-fall politics. Hoover is world leader and world feeder. Hoover's organizing executive ability and firm hand are much needed at the helm. He is the greatest western president of the greatest country under the sun. The world will join in an era of good feeling and fellowship under Herbert Hoover."

1920 SCHOOL BUDGET CALLS FOR BIG RAISE

The Pendleton school board last night adopted a budget for the fiscal year 1920-1921 calling for a total expenditure of \$126,250. The budget will be voted on at a school election to be held Tuesday, February 17, and, if passed, takes effect June 20.

Compared with the \$98,500 voted for this year's expenses the proposed budget indicates a 25 per cent increase. Most of this is absorbed by new salary schedules which will be put into effect next year. In this year's budget provision was made for \$10,000 for salaries but increases already granted will bring the figure between \$9000 and \$10,000 higher. Salaries for 1920-1921 are placed at \$75,000, a 50 per cent increase over this year's original budget.

Practically all other items in the budget remain as for this year the \$27,750 increase being virtually all for increases in salaries.

PERSHING'S BANQUET CHANGES TO OVATION FOR HERBERT HOOVER

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27.—Fifteen hundred persons who gathered here Saturday night to welcome General Pershing suddenly turned the meeting into an ovation for Herbert Hoover, when the latter's name was casually mentioned during a welcoming address.

For several minutes Hoover's name was cheered in a spontaneous outburst of enthusiasm.

Men strung to their feet and waved their arms.

The welcome was tendered to Pershing by the Commercial club. Frederick Wharton, toastmaster, was introducing Pershing when he mentioned Hoover. He declared that Pershing would occupy a niche in the annals of America "similar to those occupied by Washington, Lincoln, Grant, Roosevelt and Wilson."

Ho got no further.

ONLY GIRL FIRETRUCK SALESMAN IN U. S. IS IN PENDLETON TODAY

Miss Helen A. Courtney, of Seattle, the only girl fire truck salesman in the United States, is in Pendleton today conferring with Fire Chief W. E. Ringold, Joe Eli, Chairman of the fire committee of the city council and Mayor John L. Vaughan. She represents the Seagrave Company. Miss Courtney has been at the fire truck game for about two years but in that time has made such a record for sales that she is the mainstay of the Seagrave Company in the northwest and her territory extends as far east as the North Dakota line. The fire truck now in use in the department here is one of the earliest put out by the Seagrave Company and she is endeavoring to sell one of the latest products of her concern.

In the January issue of the American Magazine the young lady featured with a full page story in the department devoted to interesting personalities. She holds membership in the Association of Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs and never misses a meeting of fire department heads.

DAVID HOUSTON WILL BE NAMED SECRETARY OF U. S. TREASURY

Present Holder of Office in Agriculture Department to be Succeeded by Edwin Meredith, Iowa Editor.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—David Houston, secretary of agriculture will be appointed Secretary of the treasury by President Wilson it is learned at the white house today. He will be succeeded by Edwin Meredith, of Iowa, editor of the "Successful Farmer," Meredith is enroute to Washington from Miami, Florida. It is understood the men will assume their new duties immediately.

MISAPPROPRIATION OF PROPERTY IS CHARGED

Charges of concealment and misappropriation of real and personal property to her own use were made against the administratrix of the estate of the late Jesse Reeves in an objection filed in probate court today by A. T. Reeves in behalf of himself and as guardian for John W. R. L. J. M. C. M. and O. E. Reeves and Vernon Long, by D. D. Long, his guardian, heirs and legatees of the deceased. The objection prays that the final report and accounting of the administratrix be not approved.

Among charges preferred are that the administratrix has not accounted for a large part of the estate, has failed to appraise all the property left by the deceased and has concealed some of it with intent to defraud the heirs, has diverted funds and property to her own use and that her report is not regular as a result. The objectors ask that she be required to produce all property and money in the estate. S. A. Lowell and J. W. Brooks of Walla Walla represent the objectors.

LABOR GRANTED FIRST CLAIM AGAINST COMPANY DECLARING BANKRUPTCY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The supreme court, by refusing to review the case allowed the decisions of the lower courts to stand, upholding the rights of laborers under Oregon laws to priority of claims against a bankrupt company for which they worked. The suit was brought by James G. Wilson, trustee in bankruptcy for the Western Condensed Milk Company, of Newberg, Oregon, who refused to pay labor claims first.

TELEPHONE DIRECTORY SUPPLANTS WORKS OF XENEPHONE AND EUCLID

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The telephone directory has supplanted the works of Moser, Xenophon and Euclid, as preparation for teaching, Henry Golarik, district superintendent of schools, said the only examination given applicants now is: "What's your telephone number?" Teachers are that scarce, he said.

VOLUNTARY ACTION IS REQUESTED BY MAYOR

Pendleton business will not be closed because of the influenza. Such was the edict of Mayor John L. Vaughan this morning, following an informal conference of city officials. This decision holds good, however, only upon condition that all parties, dances and public gatherings be postponed and 100 per cent co-operation be forthcoming from all individuals.

Should steps now being taken fail to check the spread of the disease, a quarantine against commercial houses and all public gatherings will be enforced. The administration desires, however, that relief be gained without necessity of such stringent measures and believes that by hearty co-operation the result may be obtained. "The holding of public gatherings is not absolutely necessary at this time, is little short of criminal," Dr. H. J. Kavanaugh, city physician, said today. "The closing of the city schools will materially check the spread of the disease among the children and persons coming in contact with them by refraining from attending public gatherings." Order all household goods by telephone, keep away from meetings, dances and entertainments, is the city physician's advice.

Twenty-four more families were added to the list under quarantine this morning. Ninety-eight families had been quarantined by the city health officers up to last night. Six families were released from quarantine this morning as cured. The number now under quarantine is 114.

"WILSON" MERELY NAME DUE TO U. S. SENATE SAYS ROMAN PAPER

ROME, Jan. 27.—"Politically, President Wilson does not exist," the Popolo Romano said today, commenting on the Jugo-Slav request that the allies extend the time for consideration of allied proposition for settlement of the Adriatic dispute. The allies granted the Jugo-Slav petition for intervention for Jugo-Slavia are in vain.

HALF MILLION VOTED TO COMBAT INFLUENZA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The senate today voted an appropriation of half a million for the use of the public health service in fighting the influenza.
