AUTHORITY FOR ORDERING VACCINATION DISPUTED

of vaccination conscientiously for 45 years. As for vaccination as a preventive of disease, there is not a scrap of evidence in its favor. Injection of virus into the pure blood of the people does not prevent smallpox. Rather it tends to increase epidemics of smallpox and to make the disease more definite.

Statistics Show Skepticism.

As to actual protection from smallpox, the Bavarian government statistics show that in 1871 they had 30,000 deaths from smallpox, over 29,000 of which had been vaccinated.

Germany had nearly 125,000 deaths from smallpox in 1871 and 1872, nearly all of whom had been vaccinated. Paris has had compulsory vaccination for over 30 years, yet from 1901 to 1905 there are over 5,000 cases with 798 deaths, presumably all vaccinated. Japan, after years of the most rigid vaccination in history, in the year 1917 had over 3,000 cases of smallpox. On the United States battleship Ohio within 30 days following vaccination of her entire crew there appeared 29 cases of smallpox.

"If smallpox exists in a community, the county or city boards of health shall provide free vaccination for persons desiring protection against infection. When smallpox exists in a community no child shall be permitted to attend school without presenting satisfactory evidence of his having been successfully vaccinated within seven years."

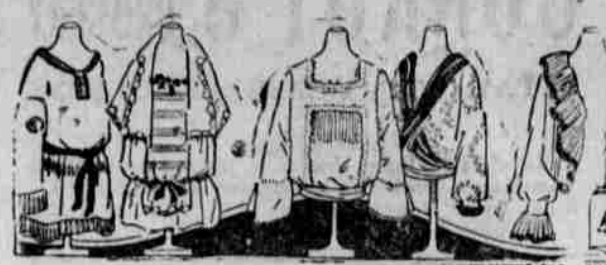
