THE DALLES CITIZENS CONTEST VACCINATION

THE DALLES, Jan. 28.—Citizens of The Dalles will carry the state law governing vaccination into the courts in order to determine the legality of the measure, it was decided at a meeting held last night. The city hall was filled to overflowing with parents who objected to having their children sent to school if they failed to receive the vaccination. The following committee was chosen to decide upon immediate action for getting quick results regarding the legality of the school law: L. J. Gates, chairman; Dr. G. E. Sanders, H. R. Rice, M. Remington and Chris McClay.

That there are now 41 cases of smallpox in the city was the statement of City Health Officer Fred Thompson. He asserted lack of cooperation on the part of the citizens was responsible for the spread of the disease. The flu is rapidly gaining headway here and may become serious unless the public supports his department, the health officer warned. He said smallpox could have been stopped in three weeks instead of continuing since last August if he had been supported.

SUMMER SCHOOL WILL STUDY AMERICANIZATION

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 28.—Americanization will be the subject of a six weeks' course of lectures in the summer session of the University of Oregon, which opens June 21 and closes July 26 next. The first half of the course will be given by Dr. Edgar Dawson, professor of history and political science in Hunter College, and the second half by Dr. Harry E. Turner, formerly of Columbia University and now professor of history in the New School of Social Research in New York. Other features noted in the preliminary announcement just made are a course in socialized education, including training for boys' scout work, a special course in physical education for men including the coaching of football, base ball, track, basketball and tennis, the instructor to be announced later.

The course in Americanization is part of the nation-wide movement to assimilate the alien element in the United States. The specific purpose of this course in Americanization is to show what are the problems connected with the assimilation of this element in the United States and particularly in Oregon.

SIXTY THOUSAND MAY SAVE DAYLIGHT SANS OPERATION ON CLOCK

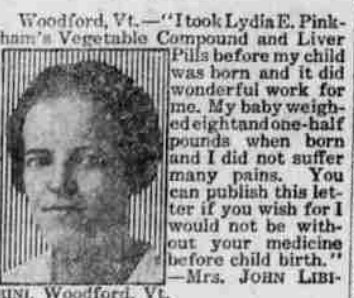

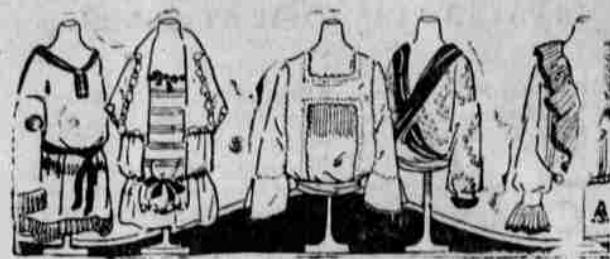
