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PRESIDENTIAL TIMBER

DESPITE efforts of the treaty, prohibition and high prices to concentrate attention of the nation, the coming presidential race cannot be laid aside in the interests of the people. The electorate of the United States is already considering likely men as tenants for the White House beginning March 4, 1921.

The first struggle for votes has been fought in the republican ranks and Leonard Wood and Frank Lowden drew, with two each. Sentiment in the east at this time ranks the army man as favorite for the nomination in his party with the governor of Illinois, second.

On the democratic wing, three names on the lips of every citizen throughout the war hold prominence. Foremost among these now is that of Herbert Hoover, food administrator. Hoover, it is true, is being claimed by each of the old parties and has not declared himself. His greatest admirers characterize him as a man so well qualified as to place party affiliation subordinate.

A. Mitchell Palmer who became attorney general after attaining prominence as alien property custodian, has a following in the east, yet in this section he is little known. His chances of support from labor are not considered good because of the use of the injunction against strikers since he became attorney general.

The status of President Wilson's son-in-law, William G. McAdoo, remains the mystery of the pre-campaigners. McAdoo is sitting tight, perhaps to make his entry in the race at the eleventh hour. As a businessman and as a cabinet member he is today one of the best-known of national figures.

Besides these five, considered leaders in the nomination race, there are Senators Pomerene, Poindexter, Johnson, Governor Cox, of Ohio, Bryan and numerous others to have their say. The country is not to lack for quantity in presidential timber; therefore an early start is advisable in finding qualifications.

CREDIT THE FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM

REPORTS of bank earnings for the year 1919, just following the close of a war that rocked the world for almost half a decade, are a new and eloquent tribute to the Federal Reserve System under which the financial institutions of the country have been operating since 1914. That there should have been no failures or panics or depression in a period when the country was turning from the business of war to the pursuits of peace; when the immense debts incurred in the conflict with Germany were at their maximum; when four millions of men were replaced in the industries from which they were drawn to fill the army and navy is without parallel, but that this very time was one of prosperity and soundness beyond comparison is no less than marvellous.

The figures are the most startling testimony at once of the Federal Reserve System's incalculable value and of the nation's wonderful position. Gross earnings of the banking institutions, the comptroller of the currency reports, were \$1,000,000,000 in 1919. In the same twelve months their net profits were approximately \$300,000,000. These figures testify not only to the healthfulness of business and industry in the past year. They are an earmark of the prosperity of the year to come.

Who of all the critics of the Federal Reserve System when it was in process of creation would propose its disestablishment now in the face of the facts?

Motion pictures will play a new part in the education of the American public when films showing the original constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence will be exhibited. Photographs of the historic documents were recently made by the cinema camera and will be shown throughout the land as an antidote for ultra-radicalism.

"PICTURE BRIDE" WILL BE GIVEN HEARING

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 25.—Taka Hiko-yama, Japanese "picture bride," will be given a hearing here this week at which immigration officers will decide whether or not she will be sent back to Japan because she left her "picture bridegroom" a few days after she arrived here from the orient. N. Shibata, the bridegroom, caused her arrest on charges that she married him only to get into the United States. The bride said Shibata's financial condition was not what he had represented to her parents before she left Japan. When she was arrested she deposited \$200 bail and entered a bonded missionary home here. Shibata owns a Kansas farm.

FASHION WORLD HEARS RUMOR OF WASP WAIST

PARIS, Jan. 25.—Whispers are heard in circles of fashion that small waists "are to come in" next season. Strictest secrecy is being maintained in professional quarters in accordance with a decision by great dress making establishments here not to make premature revelations, but it is said points designed after the new mode have been seen and admired. Authorities in the dress-making trade, however, deny tight lacing is to return, one of them saying: "The wasp waist is as obsolete as the stage coach or the sedan chair."

FORMER WHITMAN STAR OF GRIDIRON FAME IS FOUND DEAD AT PASCO

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Jan. 29.—Lester ("Trixie") McDonald, famous halfback of the Whitman college football team of a few years ago, was found dead in a hotel at Pasco Monday, according to word received at Whitman college. Death came as a result of strangulation when he fell unconscious from a nervous disorder, his throat striking the edge of a stool in such a way as to shut off the wind pipe.

McDonald was a four year letterman at Whitman and was one of the few men to score a touchdown on Coach Gilmore Doble's University of Washington team, accomplished that feat in 1914 on a straight line buck. He was an instructor and coach of athletics in the Pasco high school.
