



CHINESE SETTINGS FOR "THE FORBIDDEN CITY"

Mr. T. L. Yama, the Chinese research expert, who was assisting Mr. Rothman and the technical director in the selection of sets and properties was called in. Mr. Yama visited Yama Farms, and after looking at the garden

declared that it so closely resembled gardens in China, one would imagine they were walking in the emperor's grounds. Miss Talmadge and her company were busy at Yama Farms Inn for several weeks. All of the outdoor scenes in the early part of the story were taken at this place, and a number of former Pekinese have since declared that the scenes remind them of the famous gardens in their native city.

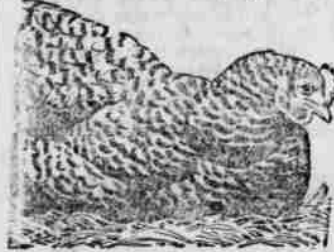

Bessie Barriscale gives another proof of her versatility in "Kitty Kelly, M. D.," her new Robertson-Cole release, distributed by Exhibitors Mutual. The popular blonde star's success in this production is unique, inasmuch as the role is different from anything she has essayed for some time. Heretofore, the beautiful Bessie has specialized in society dramas, but in "Kitty Kelly, M. D.," she assumes the role of a woman doctor in a western mining town, and the change is decidedly refreshing.

When the horny-handed miners of Fracas Arizona, heard that a woman doctor was coming into their midst, the boys anticipated having a lot of fun with the feminist, and formed a reception committee to meet her at the train and give her the "razzberry." They changed their minds when a very chic, very pretty, and very-much-alive young lady stepped into their midst. The old "razz" was converted into an enthusiastic reception, while every male in town quickly developed a tummy-ache, liver complaint or incipient tuberculosis.

Young Rand, foreman of the mine, develops an acute case of heart-trouble but is put on probation and a Rev. Mr. when he becomes too presumptuous. SHOT FROM AMBUSH IS FIRED ON TRAIN OF CLACKAMAS WORKMEN

OREGON CITY, Jan. 28.—Three shots were fired from an ambush last night into a logging train bringing workmen from the woods to the Maguire's logging camp in the Deer Creek region about four miles from Boring, Or. One man, whose name was not learned, was shot through the shoulder, another bullet passed through the clothing of a second workman on the train, and a third bullet embedded itself in the woodwork of the car.

Sheriff Wilson who was notified made an investigation, but said no trace of the person firing the shot could be found and no motive for the shooting was known. The injured man was removed to the hospital at Gresham.

EX-SOLDIER HAS PIECE OF SKULL TAKEN OUT

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—C. Clarence Lakin, 1184 Ivon street, yesterday submitted to an operation at St. Vincent's hospital for removal of a segment of bone from the skull. The operation, which was for the purpose of relieving pressure on the brain, caused by a fracture was reported successful. The young man's injury, according to relatives, was received in the blowing up of a tank in France, when he left his own unit and advanced to the battle lines with the 345th tank corps.

Fortunately the belt stopped off the pulley, preventing her from being killed outright. As it is she is in the hospital in a serious condition.

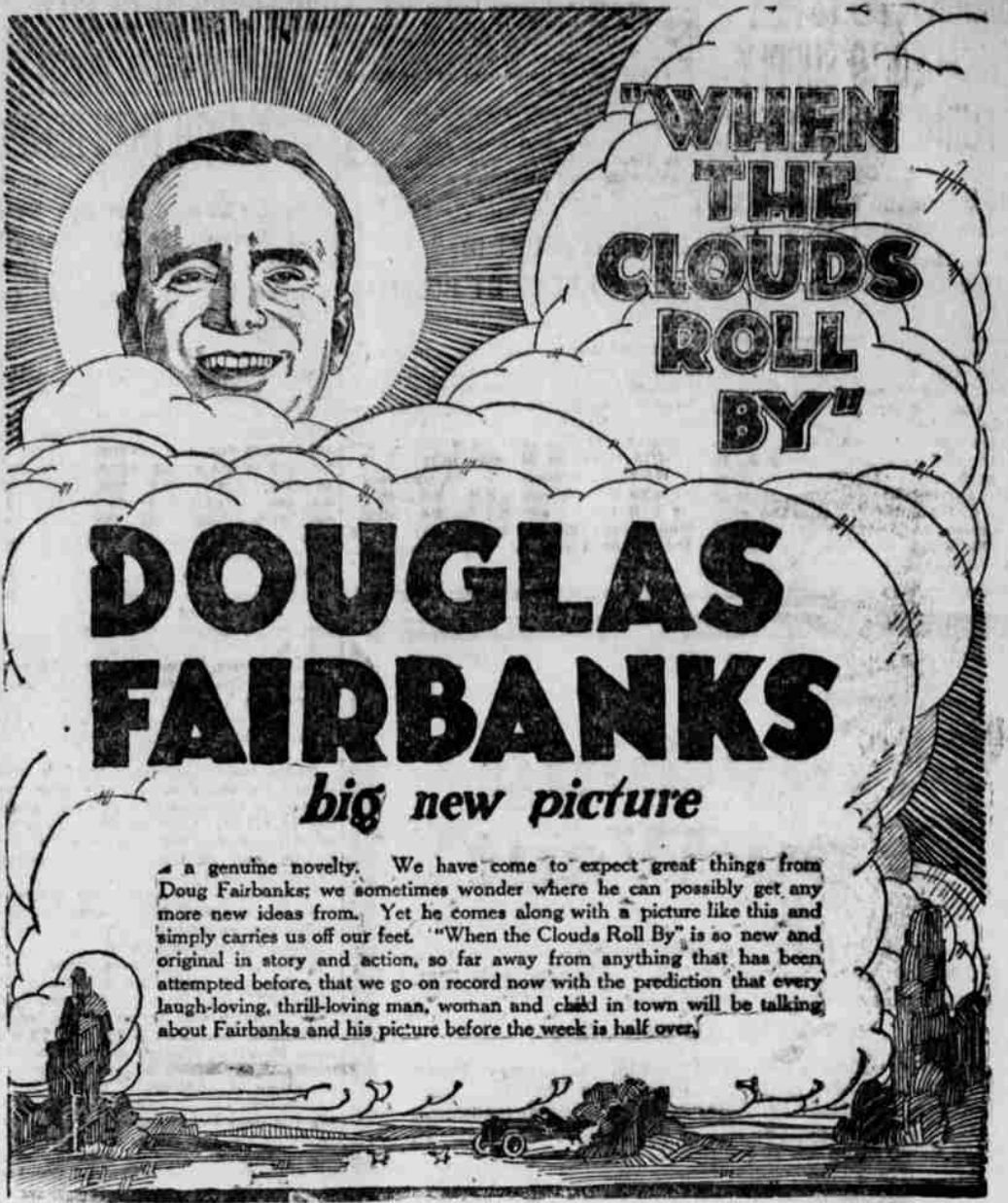
