He attended the meeting of the National Livestock Association held recently in Spokane and says that the work of the Survey was commended by the stockmen. It was decided at the meeting to petition Congress for more money to carry on the work of the Survey.

Medernach Funeral Tomorrow.

The funeral of the late Dr. Harry A. Medernach, former Pendleton man who died recently in Portland, will be held at Holman's parlors tomorrow at 8:30 a. m. Requiem mass will be offered and interment will be at Rose City cemetery. Dr. Medernach, who was 42 years of age, is survived by his wife, Mrs. Justine Medernach and a 10 year old daughter, Harriett Medernach.

John Does Face Judge.

Three young men of the John Doe family were fined \$10 each in police court this morning on a charge of being drunk. All pleaded guilty and paid fines. Henry Jones and John George, Indians, received like sentences for a similar offense and paid fines. Harry Ford, colored, was the sixth alleged inebriate and his portion was five days in jail in lieu of the \$10 fine assessed against him.

Have Hospital In Parsonage.

An emergency influenza hospital is in operation at Pilot Rock, says Miss Stasia P. Walsh, Red Cross nurse who arrived from Pilot Rock today after establishing the hospital. The hospital is located in the residence formerly occupied by Rev. and Mrs. J. T. Bickford, who recently left for China. Five patients are accommodated in the building. Miss Walsh is leaving the hospital in charge of Miss Martha Johnson, while Miss Walsh leaves to take charge of a hospital at Hermiston.

Manufacturers' Directory Out.

A 165-page directory of Oregon manufacturers issued by the Associated Industries of Oregon, has just been distributed and copies are being received in Pendleton. The booklet is the first attempt on the part of any such organization to compile a list of all the manufacturers in Oregon and is intended for use as a reference book. It is indexed both by towns having manufacturers and by commodities manufactured in various towns.

Methodists Not to Have Services.
