O. A. C. LOOKS TO STATE TO GIVE RELIEF FROM FINANCIAL CONDITION

OREGON AGRICULTURE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 29.—The college is now looking to the people of Oregon to give relief to the present critical financial condition brought about through the doubling of the student enrollment, and the increased cost of maintenance in every department. The state legislature has made it possible for the people to pass on the future of the institution at the general election, May 21.

It has been estimated that at least six-tenths of one mill in addition to the present income would be required, this in addition to a contemplated income from a tuition and other fees that might be received from students. The legislature decided, however, that no tuition should be charged in addition to the fees as now charged, and that there should be no special tuition fee for non-resident students. The legislature, then, provided for a little

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less than seven-tenths of a mill, which would bring to the college on present valuation of taxable property about \$48,000 annually to cover maintenance and the cost of additional building and equipment.

In order that the present emergency might be met and additional buildings constructed as soon as possible to relieve the congestion throughout the institution, the bill contains a provision which will make available the amount appropriated beginning with the present year, should this measure be approved by the people at the May election money will be available thereafter for construction work during the summer, and it should be possible to have some new buildings ready for occupancy when college opens in September.
