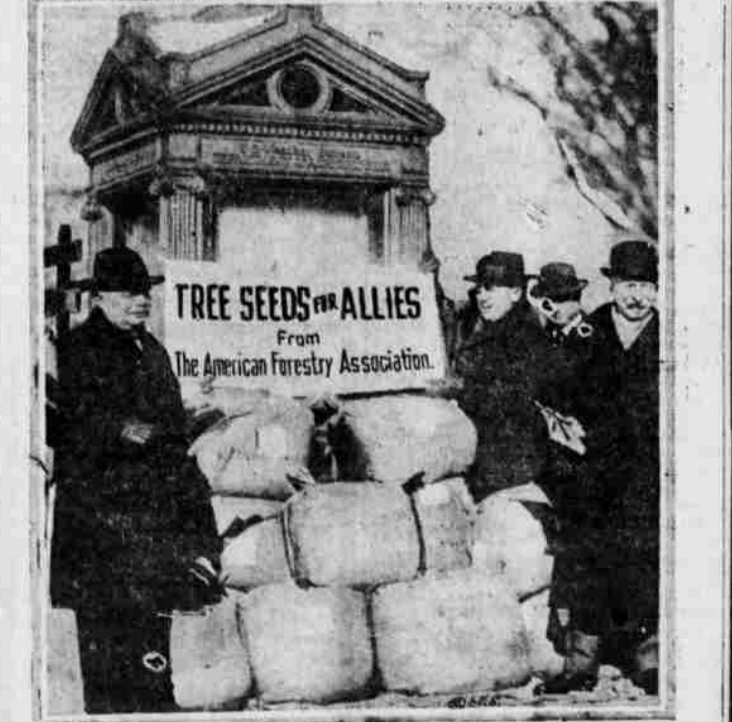

35,000,000 AMERICAN TREE SEEDS SENT TO HELP REFOREST WAR-DEVASTATED EUROPE



Thirty-five million tree seeds have been given to France, Belgium and Great Britain by the American Forestry Association of Washington to help reforest the battle areas and the green areas in Great Britain which were sacrificed to war's demands.
