FAST EXCHANGE OPENS PILOT ROCK AUCTION

(Special to the East Oregonian.) PILOT ROCK, Feb. 6.—Three hours after the community auction sale opened here this morning, \$2000 worth of farm machinery was sold. Fifty head of horses, registered sheep and bulls are being auctioned this afternoon. The sale, which is well attended, will be continued tomorrow. The terms of the sale are that all purchases under \$10 are to be paid for in cash, while those above \$10 may be paid in cash or by note, to expire October 1, 1920. If cash is paid for purchases for which the price is over \$10, a two per cent discount is allowed.

Colonel W. T. Yohnka, of Riverville, is the auctioneer. C. D. Smith, employed by the O. W. R. & N. Company, and known as "Farmer" Smith, gave a short talk to the crowd at the sale today.

FRAU KRUPP VON BOHLEN HAS NO COMPLAINT TO MAKE AGAINST YANKEE

BY CARL D. GROOT (United Press Staff Correspondent.) ESSEN, Germany, Feb. 6.—Frau Krupp von Bohlen has no complaint to make against American soldiers and officers who were billeted in her "hunting lodge" on the Rhine.

She assured me personally of this in the course of a talk here—the first interview she ever granted an American correspondent.

"I understand that Americans damaged your hunting lodge, and that you don't feel very kindly about the matter," I said.

"Why, no, not at all," she answered with an air of surprise.

"I had heard the story from American war correspondents of Cologne," I explained. "Can you tell me what the situation was?"

"Well, they were billeted in the Huntington lodge, but we found it all in good order. In fact, it certainly showed no more wear and tear than I might have had our family with the five children lived there for four or five months."

"Was anything missing—any souvenirs taken?" I asked.

"I believe we had a report that a couple of pieces of silverware—knives and forks—were missing, but that is nothing. I have no complaint about the Americans there."

When I asked if she had protested against the Americans billeting there, she replied, "There was no occasion to protest."

PORTLAND, Or., Feb. 6.—Although the connection between the cost of alfalfa and the high price of clothing may seem remote, C. P. Bishop of Salem, president of the Oregon Retail Clothiers' association, in his opening address at the first annual convention at the Hotel Portland Tuesday, insisted that a treble cost of hay has its part in the boosting of clothing prices which, though minute, is as direct as the increased wages of sheepherders, shearers, carders, designers, cutters and salesmen, or the mounting costs of dyes, threads, linings, boxes and tags.

This was part of a defense of the charges made against the retail clothier, he insisted, without knowledge of real conditions and based on adroit figuring which assumed the \$7 paid for virgin wool and the \$100 paid for the suit into which it was woven was the retailer's share.

It was admitted generally that the retail clothing business had just passed through an extremely prosperous year, but this was due to excess business, not profit speakers asserted.
