DANIELS DEFENDS AWARD OF MEDALS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Admiral Sims charges that the morale of the navy was shattered by alleged injustice of medal awards is an "insult to the splendid men of the navy." Secretary Daniels declared, testifying today before the senate naval committee in its investigation of medal awards.
Daniels said: "It is an insult to the splendid men of the navy to say their morale is seriously impaired by any awards to individuals. They are made of sterner stuff than to be rattled by a matter so unimportant in comparison with their devotion to duty."
Daniels read a lengthy, prepared statement, taking issue with Sims on the medal awards and defending his course in changing the recommendations of the Knight board. He cited precedents in support of his contention that it is justifiable to give medals to commanders who lost ships in action. Some of the brainiest men in the navy would have gone unwarded had not he changed the medal recommendations, he asserted.

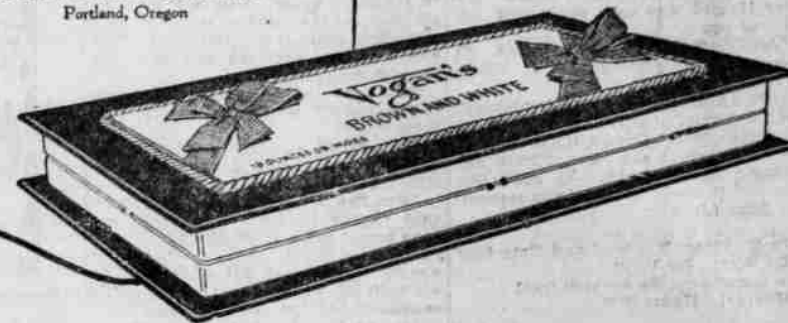

"I hereby bequeath my Christian faith in God almighty, the most precious and priceless possession which I have, or which any person can have, to my beloved children, and I commend them to the saving power of the Lord Jesus Christ, whose faithful servant I have been and still am, world without end."

The principal of the bonds at the end of five years is to be paid to his daughter, Sadie Evelyn Ford, if she is unmarried at that time. His library is to be divided among the children, each selecting the books desired. All

of his manuscripts, typewriter and desk are to be given to his son, Burgess F. Ford.
