NEWS OF THE COUNTY OFFICES AND OFFICERS

Taxes Due Week From Monday.

Collection of taxes on the 1919 roll will be started one week from Monday at the sheriff's office, the opening date being February 16. This is about a week later than usual but a larger roll made the slight delay unavoidable. Deputy A. C. Funk says that no persons call to pay their taxes before Monday, February 16.

County Licenses 985 Dogs.

To date Umatilla county has licensed 985 dogs under the new state dog law, and stragglers are still coming in, although the closing day for licenses was set for January 31. It is considered probable that Umatilla will show more licenses than any county in the state.

Gets Two Years for Forgery.

Arthur Amos was arraigned, waived time in which to plead and entered a plea of guilty to the charge of forgery at 10:30 this morning. Judge G. W. Phelps sentenced him to serve two years in the state penitentiary. Amos has an old failing for obtaining money by false pretenses and has three previous service records for similar offenses. He was caught in Vancouver, B. C., two weeks ago and charged with begging without a permit. His sentence by the British Columbia officials was one year but he was turned over to the local officials to answer to a more serious charge.

Union High School Idea Grows.

The plan for a big union high school district in the vicinity of Milton and Freewater is showing a successful growth, according to W. W. Green, county superintendent, who has been in the east end for several days this week. Petitions are now being prepared for circulation, calling for an election to consolidate a number of districts for union high school purposes. About 10 districts are expected to consolidate, giving a property valuation of about \$1,000,000. This would support a high school as modern as any city in the state now affords.

Damage Cases Postponed.

On account of illness of some of the attorneys, witnesses and litigants in the three seed-wheat suits against the Farmers Union Grain Agency, the trials originally set for Monday have been indefinitely postponed. Strand & Smith and Jack & Bain are plaintiffs in three actions for alleged damages, totaling nearly \$55,000. The jury will be called to hear the cases when health conditions will allow.

Schools Will Reopen.

The school at Ferndale, in the east end of the county, will reopen Monday after having been closed because of illness. Other county schools will also resume their work Monday.

Lieut. Laurens Morgan Hamilton

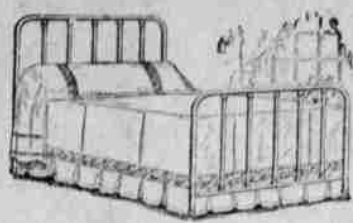

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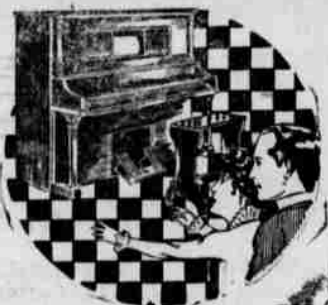
