LAST JUROR IS TAKEN

MacElfresh, and Ben Cassaranda were shot while they were seeking shelter from the rain in a hallway and declared the evidence would show they could not have been shot from the I. W. W. hall because they were protected by intervening walls.

"The evidence will further prove that Warren O. Grimm was shot by one of the defendants who were in the Avalon hotel. Grimm was at the intersection of the streets, more than 200 feet from the hall.

"We will prove that the defendants, Britt Smith, James McInerney, Ray Becker, Wesley Everett, Mike Sheehan, Bert Faulkner, and possibly one or two others were in the hall at the time of the shooting. It will be shown that Loren Roberts, Bert Bland and Ole Hanson, who has not yet been caught were shooting from Seminary ridge, and Eugene Barnett was firing from a window in the Avalon hotel. We will further show that John Lamb and O. C. Bland fired directly down on the parade from the Arnold hotel."

Taking up the plot which is alleged to have been laid some time before Armistice day, Allen said the testimony would show that various conferences had been held, plans discussed, arms brought, and places arranged where the various defendants would station themselves to fire on the parade.

"The evidence will show that it was premeditated and prearranged; that the defendants participated in a conspiracy to kill ex-service men; that while some of the defendants did not actually shoot, nevertheless they were present, aiding, abetting, encouraging, and countenancing such a conspiracy and actually participated in carrying out such plans," Allen said.

Raid Story Coined.

It will be shown that any information the defendants had of a purported raid to be made by the former soldiers came from the men themselves or someone in sympathy with them, to be used as a possible excuse for the shooting they were planning to do, he continued.

Allen told of Roberts' confession of the alleged crime after his voluntary surrender. He said the evidence might not clearly establish that Bert Faulkner and Mike Sheehan had actually done any shooting, but they were present and approved of the plan.

The prosecuting attorney told of the part played by Elmer Smith in the plan of the visit Smith paid the I. W. W. hall about an hour before the parade began and of the conversations he had with Britt Smith, the I. W. W. secretary. Elmer Smith, he said, was arrested at his office shortly after the shooting.

"The testimony will prove that the defendant Elmer Smith knew of the plan of the defendants and made and that he knew these other defendants were planning to shoot the parade for the purpose of shooting the ar-



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mer soldiers," Allen concluded, "and when we have proved these contentions I have outlined we shall ask a verdict of guilty as charged."

"Taken On Looks"

MONTESANO, Feb. 7.—A sporting offer to accept James Ball, Montezano blacksmith, the last salesman in the special venire, as alternate juror for the Centennial murder case resulted in his selection without examination. "We'll take the juror on his looks," Attorney Vanderveer declared when Ball came forward to be examined. "We'll take you," Prosecutor Abel responded.

Thus the selection of the jury came to an end just before the noon recess today after the last name of the jury list had been called.

"The court does not intend to be lectured by the counsel for either side every time a ruling is made," was the several rebuke Judge Wilson administered to Vanderveer during the morning session.
