Small Boy Fell in Millrace.

Adults were called to the aid of the little youngster and he was brought to shore unharmed except for the wetting.

Restaurants Change Hands.

The Hong Kong restaurant, on Main street, has been purchased from Jack Lum by Eng Louis who has operated the Con Tung Low restaurant in the State hotel building for a number of years. The new owner has taken possession of the Hong Kong restaurant and will operate it exclusively after March 1, the lease at that time expiring on his other place at Cottonwood and Webb streets.

County Delegates Meet Tomorrow.

Delegates from the four American Legion posts in the county will meet Wednesday evening in the reading room of the Commercial Association to perfect plans for the county-wide membership campaign to be staged during the last week of February. Formal invitations will also be given the out of town delegates to attend the smoker and high jinks to be given by Pendleton Post on the night of February 28.

Three Building Permits Issued.

Three building permits were issued by the city recorder on Monday, for a total of \$8550. The largest permit was to the Episcopal church, which will erect a new basement and install a steam heating plant. The cost is to be \$7500. R. F. Heyden, of 1905 East Court, was issued a permit to erect a wash house and laundry to cost \$250. B. L. Burroughs, Inc., was issued a permit to erect a warehouse addition at a cost of \$800.

Schools Have 85 Per Cent Attendance.

Attendance in the city schools yesterday was 85 per cent, according to reports from City Superintendent F. P. Austin today. This is considered exceptionally good for the first day following an enforced vacation of two weeks. The teachers and pupils who attended appeared to be in good health and further trouble is not expected. New Students at High School.

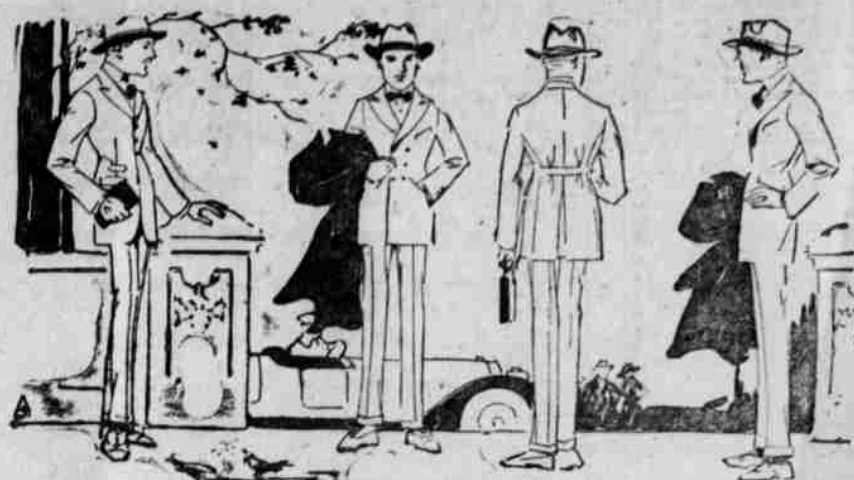

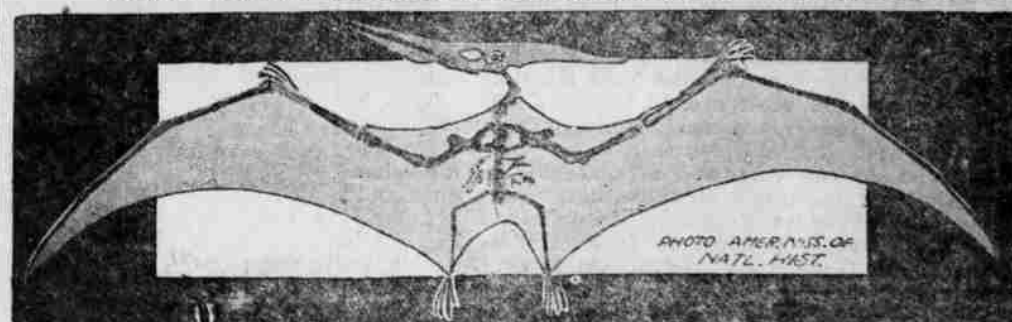
