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WHY HOOVER FAVORS THE LEAGUE

MR. R. HOOVER says that if the treaty question goes before the people in the presidential election he will support the party that stands for the League of Nations. He sees in the league a hope not only of prevention of warfare but for a reduction in military costs. His view is worth having because his experience has given him a splendid opportunity to appraise the subject. He has seen the cruel cost of war and the impoverishment that comes from excessive militarism. As an economist the league appeals to him. It may be assumed, however, that the Hoover preference is for a real league, not for the useless denatured affair the Lodge program calls for. Having seen what he has seen, Herbert Hoover will have scant patience with those who would give us a sham league that could function with scarcely more success than did the Hague tribunal. In speaking for any needed clarifying resolution to set forth the American position Mr. Hoover takes practically the same position as President Wilson himself. Those who assert that his statement supports the Lodge position are far from the facts. The Lodge reservations constitute a defiant repudiation of the league covenant's most vital provisions. It is an effort to kill the league by indirect methods and the statement issued yesterday indicates that one Herbert Hoover is awake to the situation and whether or not he becomes a presidential nominee he will have something to say this fall.

THE ARMENIANS DID FIGHT

ANY people, hearing of the plight of the Armenians, have wondered why those people did not fight the Turks. The impression has been broadcast that the Armenians tamely submitted to misuse and slaughter. Mr. Irvine's eloquent appeal last evening sets us clear upon the point. He showed that when they had a chance the Armenians not only fought but they fought like demons. A small army of Armenians held a vastly superior Turkish force away from the Baku oil fields until Allenby arrived. They rendered a service of real importance to the allied cause though the credit in press reports was given to the French because the Armenian fighters were garbed in the French uniform. At other times also the stricken people displayed the greatest courage and fortitude. They chose exile and starvation to sacrifice of their religious convictions. The Armenians are unquestionably entitled to a helping hand from those living in more fortunate lands.

THE SALE OF THE NEW YORK HERALD

AN interesting event in American newspaperdom was the recent purchase of the New York Herald by Frank A. Munsey and the combination of the Herald with the Sun under the name of the Sun and New York Herald.

The sum of \$4,000,000 was paid for the Herald. This despite the fact the Herald is to lose its building this year through the expiration of its ground lease, regardless of the fact the Herald had lost its old time vigor and influence and has a mechanical plant that is worn out and according to the new owner could not be modernized for less than a million dollars.

The Herald was established by James Gordon Bennett in 1835 and later published by his son, James Gordon Bennett, Jr., who died in 1918. At its outset the Herald was a vigorous newspaper, devoted to public service and avowedly free from partisan or factional ties. It was for years a newspaper of great influence, but in recent years had lost its hold through becoming somewhat of a class paper of reactionary tone. It finally met the fate that has overtaken many other publications which after rising to influence have weakened through catering to a privileged class rather than to the general public.

Frank A. Munsey, new owner of the Herald, is a multi-millionaire. He already owned two New York dailies, a number of dailies located in other cities and various magazines. His first experience was in the magazine field where he met with success. It is said that he went to New York from New England and started his first venture with \$40 in personal capital and some stories he had written himself. His success is a remarkable tribute to his ability as a publisher.

Since the railroads are to be turned back to private owners March 1 it seems natural that the director general should defer action on the demand for a wage increase. The new management will have to meet the bills and should have a voice in incurring the obligations to be assumed. It would be a mistake for the union officials to force a strike at this time.

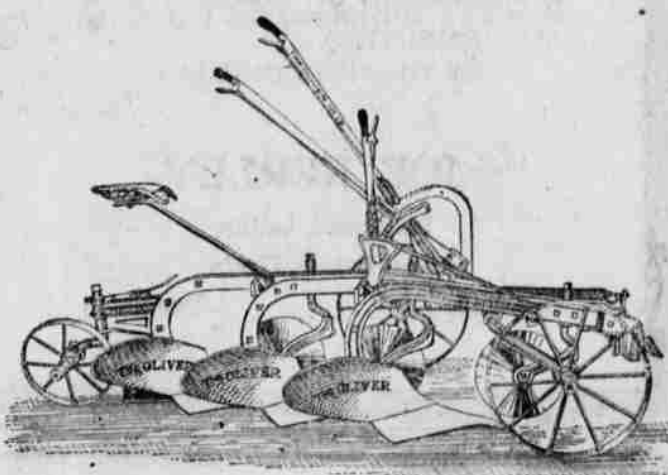
