All youngsters of any color or race are permitted to compete. There are many fine prizes being offered and it is hoped that Pendleton high will produce a prize winner. The essays are to be about 400 words in length.

Economist Hits Anarchy.

A new economics class has been added to the curriculum of Pendleton high school. H. E. Inlow, principal, is teaching the class, which is composed chiefly of boys. There are 15 in the class. Mr. Inlow considers the study of the social sciences especially important at this time of social unrest and according to the interest which is being manifested by the students in the work much good is bound to result.

Field Days Coming.

At the military drill period this morning at the high school commandant Fleischmann completed the work of reorganizing the Boy's Cadet Corps. Companies 2 and 3 are consolidated for the time being under the command of Lieutenant Lloyd Austin. It was announced that lists for entries for field days will be posted soon and that there will be opportunities for all boys to sign up for some event.

Good Meals at H. S.

The cafeteria at the high school which reopened this week is doing ably business. The food is good and varies from day to day and the prices are very reasonable. If everything on the menu is taken the bill amounts to about 30 cents. Mrs. M. Hoover, famous for her good cooking is in charge. Crowds at Christian Church Revival.

Evangelists H. E. Wilhite and P. O. Gates are drawing great crowds at the Christian church. Last night was probably the greatest service of the meetings to date. Prof. Gates sang two solos, "Nobody Told Me of Jesus," and "Sowing the Tares." Evangelist Wilhite gave the audience one of his very best sermons, his subject being "Reproduction in Kind." He divided this address as follows: "Like Produces Like." "The Harvest multiplies upon the sowing." "Bad is voluntary

Good is involuntary," and "The sowing time is limited." The speaker said the text called for the consideration of the parallelism existing between sowing and reaping in the natural world, and the analogous process in the spiritual world. With scathing rebuke he scored the slanderer, profligate, and meddler. "A word sown to an angel celestial or infernal," he said. "Tonight the subject will be, 'Rightly Dividing the Word of Truth.'"

VISIONS OF INCREASED COFFEE PRICE LOOMS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Visions of further increased prices in coffee were the theme of the following statement that coffee imports in 1919 doubled in value as compared with 1918, though there was but a slight increase in quantity.

A blighted coffee crop in Brazil, prohibition and a strenuous coffee advertising campaign are blamed for the jump, which will have to be met by every American household.

According to department of commerce figures, 1,235,522,102 pounds of coffee were imported by the United States at a cost of \$239,400,798. This is more than double what was paid for the 1,215,288,752 pounds imported in 1917. In 1918, 995,514,598 pounds were imported at a cost of \$82,522,306. Prices are still rising according to latest monthly statistics. In November 1918 million pounds were imported at a cost of \$25,321,726. October figures showed coffee imports amounted to 102 million pounds, valued at \$24,445,458.

FIVE U. S. SUBMARINES WIN BATTLE WITH SEA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(later)—The submarine N-2 is now safe in American waters, the navy department was advised.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—After battling with the sea for nearly a week, four or five American submarines that have been missing between the Bermuda Islands and this coast, arrived at Hampton Roads this morning, according to the navy department. The N-2 is the submarine still missing.

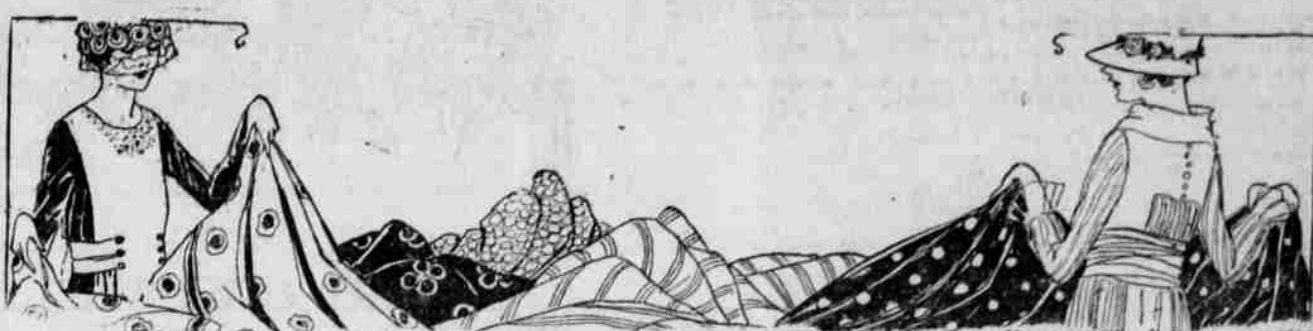

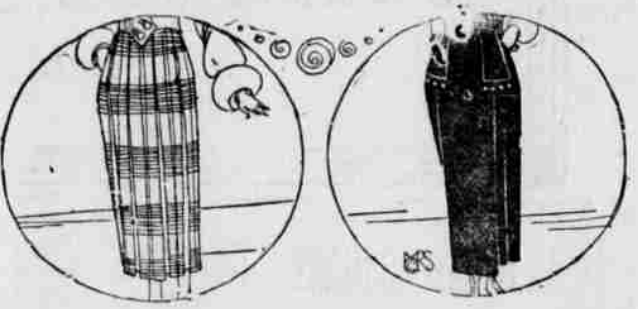

WILD WEST IN PALMIEST DAY HAD NOTHING ON CITY OF BERLIN, 1920

BERLIN, Feb. 11.—The "Wild West" in its palmy days had nothing on Berlin, in this year of grace, 1920. It's just about as safe for a postal driver with his wagonload of mail and parcels to stir out in a thickly populated part of Berlin as it was for a stagecoach driver to venture across the American plains in the days of Deadwood Dick, Jesse James and others of their ilk.

Every day or two, some Desperate Detritch or Fearful Franz steps out from the sidewalk, shoves a bit of artillery in the face of postal driver and his assistant, says quietly but firmly

"die Haende hoch"—meaning hands up—and then proceeds to frisk the postwoman of all registered mail.

Hauls Tremendous. The losses to the postal department to date have been tremendous, especially in hauls of registered letters from foreign countries. So far, none of the stickup men has ever gotten himself into bodily danger, for while the postmen travel armed, they generally make little or no efforts to get at their rate.

The first thing that the public knows about it is a sign on the bulletin boards announcing 5,000 marks' reward for the apprehension of the highwaymen. Berlin has long since ceased to pay much attention to highway robberies or anything of that sort.

Thefts Part of Routine. As for burglaries, they're simply a

part of the daily routine. Locks and bars don't bother the modern Berlin burglar in the least. A person's household goods or jewels are no safer in a burglar-proof vault than they would be in the street.

Recently, a daring daylight thief made the rounds of a couple of prominent hotels, getting away with a number of valuable fur coats and many jewels. Daylight and nighttime hold-ups of individuals are as prevalent as coolies in any army.
