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IT SHOULD AID THE WHEAT INDUSTRY

WITH the ship situation rapidly returning to normal there is revival of pre war plans for the establishment of regular steamer lines between Pacific coast ports and Europe via the Panama canal. When the war started, just as the canal was opened, plans were underway for a steamer service between Seattle, Astoria and San Francisco and Europe. Naturally the war called this program to a halt but it is now rumored that the advent of such a service is not far distant.

In the prospect for such a service there is hope for the wheatman and milling men of the northwest. A regular steamer service between this coast and Europe will mean more dependable carriers for exporting wheat and flour. It will mean that exporters will not have to charter ships but will be able to ship on regular steamers in large or small quantities, according to their needs. It will end much of the mystery that has always enshrouded the export end of the wheat business. It should mean more competition among exporters because the field will be open to all who wish to try it. An individual farmer not satisfied with the price offered him here, could ship his wheat direct to Liverpool if he wished.

We have not yet received the benefits of the Panama canal and it will be highly interesting to see ocean tonnage restored so that the full effects of that great improvement can be noted.

IT IS HERE TO STAY

DISCONTENT over prohibition is voiced in some eastern newspapers. This is to be expected because the dry regime is new to the east and no one could expect the transition period to pass without complaint from some.

When the east has been dry as long as the west, prohibition will be generally favored. It means the elimination of much disorder and misery. It means more productive labor and less labor wasted in a field catering to human vices. It means more efficiency in industry and better business conditions; more prosperous homes and happier people.

It may be humiliating for New York pride to accept a social reform that found its chief strength in the west and south. But Father Knickerbocker must get used to that and when he does he will like it.

TEST GRINDING PROVES MILL MACHINERY GOOD

ASTORIA, Feb. 11.—The machinery for the first mill of the Astoria Flouring Mills company's new plant at the port terminal has been operated for the past few days as a test, and has been found to work satisfactorily. It is expected this unit, which will have a capacity of 2000 barrels of flour a day, will begin grinding within the next two or three days.

The second unit of the plant will be ready for operation in about six weeks. The new plant will be one of the largest single mills of its kind in the country. It will turn out 4000 barrels of high-grade flour each 24 hours. With the company's present mill also in operation the daily output will be increased to 5200 barrels, sufficient to provide a full steamer cargo for export each month.

NEW JERSEY RATIFIES SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT

TRENTON, Feb. 11.—The Federal suffrage amendment was ratified by New Jersey today when the assembly, by a 24 to 24 vote, passed the senate ratification measure, following an all-night session. The senate passed it Monday, by a vote of 15 to 2. New Jersey is the twenty-ninth state to ratify the federal amendment.

Sunday, Sept. 22.—That "rumor" of the move meant a most strenuous Sabbath for us. I took it in a very happy and worshipful spirit, for we were supplying the men getting ready to return to the lines. For in Doullens, France, the rumor has materialized and some are already on the move to entrain for Peronne. Now we know how to spell the place we are going, but we hear that there is little of "Peronne" left, though it was a city of many thousands before the war. The Germans have just been driven out and are retreating toward the St. Quentin canal which is the strong part of the Hindenburg line.

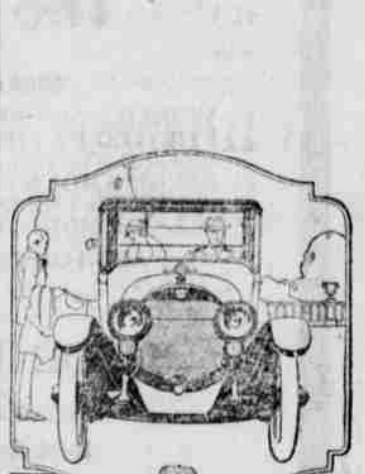
