TOTAL OF OREGON MEN KILLED IN WAR IS 1868; WOUNDED LIST HAS 1054

Official Revised Summary of
Casualties by States Shows
None Missing in Action But
Death Causes Varied.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The official revised summary of casualties by states issued by the adjutant general show the following for Oregon.
Killed in action, 1868, of whom 61 were officers; died from wounds, 79, including 5 officers; died of disease, 161, including 3 officers; died from accident, 15, including 3 officers; drowned, 4; committed suicide, 2; executed by order of court-martial, 1; other known cases, 25; cause undetermined, 13; presumed dead, 5, including 1 officer; total dead, 512, including 29 officers; taken prisoner, 11, including 1

\$3,400,000 ASKED FOR VAST AIR MAIL ROUTE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Assistant Postmaster General Praeger today presented plans for vastly extending the airplane mail service to the senate "notorious committee." He asked for \$3,400,000 for present and proposed new routes.
Praeger proposed the following new routes:
New York to San Francisco, via St. Louis.
Pittsburg to Kansas City, via St. Louis.
Detroit to Cleveland, via Toledo.
St. Louis-St. Paul and Minneapolis, via Chicago.
New York-Chicago and New York-Washington routes have already been established.

JUDGE McCOURT HOLDS POWER OF HEALTH LAW PLAIN BEYOND DISPUTE

Opposition to Vaccination Encounters Barrier When Injunction Against Enforcement of Statute is Denied.

PORTLAND, Feb. 11.—Opposition to the vaccination of school children encountered a stone wall yesterday when Presiding Circuit Judge McCourt denied an application for an injunction against enforcement of school and health board quarantine rules in the smallpox epidemic, stating that under the facts presented and undisputed rules of law no basis for a restraining order existed.
Power of the state and city health authorities in the handling of a disease menace is as complete as the language of the law can make it, commented Judge McCourt, reading the state laws which empowers them to prohibit attendance at school of any pupil or the attendance of all vaccinated children during such periods as deemed advisable.
Board's Acts Are Not Questioned.
"The city health board has made an effort in good faith to suppress the volume of disease and eradicate it," declared the jurist, in ruling on the petition.
"There is no question of the good faith of that body and the law is clear. The court only can interfere in case of abuse of power by the health board and no such abuse is charged. Its action in this case is clearly authorized by law."
Mother Files Suit.
The decision was made in the injunction suit begun by Mrs. James Rogers, president of the Parent-Teacher association of the Thompson school, to prevent the enforcement of the rule of the school board that would make her four children submit to vaccination or stay out of school for 21 days with possible failure in their studies. It was brought against the city board of health and George Parrish, city health officer.

PARIS WOMAN'S CLUB ESTABLISHES "FOYER" FOR ALL AMERICANS

Hotel Petrograd is Converted
Into Beautiful Social Center
for Directing Tourists and
Entertaining Residents.

PARIS, Feb. 11.—For the thousands of American tourists in Europe and American colonists in Paris a permanent "foyer" has been established by the American Women's club of Paris. Here any American can go just as to his own home, enjoy real American home atmosphere, have his meals, meet other Americans, and if he be a tourist, get all the information about Paris, France, or any other European country available in any "tourist's bureau" in Paris.
Hotel Is Colony Center
Convinced of the need for some such American center to assist newly arrived Americans to adjust themselves to the entirely different conditions of continental Europe—especially during the first two or three weeks after their arrival—the club took over one of the Y. M. C. A. hotels formerly Hotel Petrograd, and converted it into a beautiful club house.
It will also serve as a center for social activities in the growing American colony in Paris.
A dormitory has been opened for American girls—either resident of

tourist. Emergency rooms have been set aside for "strangers" who will be harbored temporarily until other accommodations can be found.
The salons on downstairs floors are at the disposal of both men and women. Only Americans are admitted into the dining room, where meals are served three times a day.
Directs and Entertains
A "shopper's bureau" has been instituted to protect American tourists. Here Americans may learn the location and character of all shopping centers of Paris. The club's staff has catalogued stores of many kinds, according to price level and standard of quality.
The staff makes periodic calls on the stores listed, verifying its findings and making sure that there is no price discrimination against Americans.
The club's routine social program includes:
A dance for all American young people in Paris every two weeks.
An afternoon tea for American young people every Sunday afternoon, followed by supper and evening music, at which many leading Parisian artists appear, donating their service.
Various lectures and conferences for American young women, at which leading American business and professional men in Paris and prominent Frenchmen speak.

WINDOW WASHERS ON STRIKE; ASK \$48 WEEK

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—Window washers in Chicago have gone on a strike, demanding \$48 a week for experienced washers who work on extension ladders and \$44 a week for apprentices—men who have served less than six months in the business. The washers demand pay for forty-four hours a week.

**SEVEN MEN, ONE WOMAN
AND TWO STILLS SEIZED**

PRINEVILLE, Feb. 11.—Seven men and one woman have been arrested and two stills seized as the result Sunday night of raids conducted by local authorities. One still, with a capacity of 20 gallons a day, was located on the ranch of Mrs. Sarah Snodderly, six miles north of Prineville. Its seizure resulted in the arrest of Joe Ivy and his sister, Mrs. Sarah Snodderly, with about 1500 pounds of rabbit mash.
The other still was found about 10 miles southeast of here and confiscated.
Those arrested in connection with the operation of this still were Jabe Warner, Mody Warner, Gordon Warner, Charles Kerschner and Denver Good. The cases will be tried in a federal court in Portland.

NEW THEATRE TO GO UP AT GRANTS PASS

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 11.—A new theatre building is to be erected at the corner of Sixth and D streets by A. L. Edgerton, former sawmill man. The construction work to commence on Feb. 15. A long time lease has been taken of the building by George Hunt, proprietor of the only moving picture theatre now in the city. The new building will be of cement construction, 50x150 feet in size, with a seating capacity of 1000. It is stated by Mr. Hunt that it will be the most modern theatre building between Portland and San Francisco, and will cost about \$25,000, exclusive of equipment, which will cost about \$15,000.

HOOVER'S STATEMENT IS RECEIVED AS PLATFORM

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Herbert Hoover's statement declaring he is not a presidential candidate was received by official Washington as an actual declaration of his platform. Officials of both parties saw in it strong indication that Hoover is a "receptive candidate" and that his statement was destined to be a practical declaration of principles.

OIL LEASING BILL PASSED BY HOUSE FOR SIXTH TIME

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The house today passed the conference report on the oil leasing bill. The measure now goes to the senate. For the sixth time the house has passed such a bill.
Chairman Smead, of the house public lands committee, explaining the bill, said: "This bill repeals the present laws giving individuals a patent or perpetual right to government mineral and oil lands and institutes in their stead the system of leasing. It is a real conservation measure."
