LAND AND LABOR MOVE OPPOSED AT UMAPINE

UMAPINE, Feb. 11.—Hudson Bay Grange met in regular session on Friday evening and business of importance was transacted. With a large attendance, the grange unanimously endorsed the action, petitioning the county court to appoint R. P. Hamper road supervisor of the Umapine country.

Mr. McLeod and Charles Miller of the Nell Best Post of the American Legion asked for aid in the prosecution of the I. W. W. on trial at Centralia and \$11.12 was donated and forwarded to Centralia. Also a committee of Dan J. Kirk, R. W. McKie and R. E. Bean was named to make a formal protest against State Grange and its officers joining forces with the United Land and Labor League which has been organized recently, this action being contrary to the constitution of the grange.

Chicken pie and fruit pies were served as lunch at the close of the evening.

Friday afternoon, with a large number of the Vincent school patrons present the question of Umapine joining the Union High school was presented by County School Superintendent W. W. Green and other men representative of the various districts interested. While admitting the advantages of such a school and its endorsement by the schools adjacent to Milton Freewater, the patrons thought that for Umapine at the present time it was not advisable to go in with the other districts. One of the difficulties would be the distance, bad roads, zero weather, fogs etc., and the very early rising it would require to get boys and girls off by 7 o'clock and their late return in the evening.

Parents feel too that with a school located at such a distance, as it undoubtedly would be, would necessitate their boys and girls being away from home too much.
