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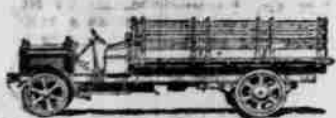

**CO-OPERATIVE CONGRESS
IS CONVENED IN CHICAGO**

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—Delegates from farmers' organizations, national labor bodies and co-operative associations arrived in Chicago today for the opening of the All-American Co-operative congress here.

The congress was called by the newly organized All-American Farmer-Labor Co-operative commission, of

which C. H. Gustafson, president of the Nebraska Farmers' Union, is the head.

The congress will consider fully the present status of the co-operative movement throughout the country and will plan a definite program for co-ordinating all co-operative work, Gustafson said.

Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, is general treasurer, and O. H. McGill of Seattle, Wash., general secretary, of co-operative commission, which called the congress.

MEXICAN GOVERNMENT LOOKS FOR RESUMPTION OF BRITISH RELATIONS

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 12.—Following the return from Europe of General Canales Aguilar, Mexican Secretary of Foreign Relations, there has been increased talk of a resumption of diplomatic relations between Mexico and Great Britain.

Aguilar declared the other day that he believed official intercourse between the two nations would be resumed at an early date. While in England, he said, he conferred with a number of officials who expressed the desire that relations be resumed.

Should Britain renew recognition of the Carranza Government, it is predicted that her action would be followed by an influx of British capital into Mexico and an intensive commercial drive. The Mexican railway system has been a bone of contention between the two nations and it is understood the latter are negotiating now for control of the Mexican Railway Line to Vera Cruz.
