Antonine Rodine, aged 17, an Indian of the reservation district, died yesterday of the Spanish influenza. His funeral will be held today from the Catholic mission. He is survived by his grandmother, Louise LaCourse. His parents died a few years ago.

W. M. Miles was issued a permit by the city recorder today to move the old dwelling from the K. of P. property on Water street to a lot on Jane street. There it will be placed on a new foundation. The estimated expenditure will be \$10.
