Will Enforce Turning Provision.
Drivers of vehicles who persist in cutting in when turning to the left at street intersections are due for some financial embarrassment if caught by Traffic Officer William Lyday. He has recently had several small cement markers made which will be spiked to the center of the principal street intersections to guide the turning of vehicles. The ordinance referring to the turning and which will be rigidly enforced when the markers are placed, is as follows: "All vehicles approaching an intersection of a street with the intention of turning thereat shall in turning to the right keep closely to the right and in turning to the left shall run up to and beyond the center of the intersection."

RACE SUICIDE, NOT ABSENT FAMILIES, IS CENSUS TROUBLE

PORTLAND, Feb. 13.—Race suicide and not absent families are causing heavy re-surveys of federal census statistics, William D. Bennett, Multnomah county supervisor of the fourteenth census, today declared. "Families are not so large as they were formerly," Bennett said. "When statistics, William D. Bennett, Multnomah county supervisor, said, 'I believe it will be found that the average family has shrunk from five to less than four members.' "The trouble with Los Angeles, San Francisco, and every other American city is that it thinks it has more people than it has. Los Angeles has 150,000 short, as it claims. I don't think it ever had the 700,000 persons it claims. "Many Portland families have only

two children. Many have only one. And in one average district—not an apartment or boarding house district, either—I found that of 270 families, 95 did not have any children at all. "Race suicide—that's what's causing these cries of 'incomplete returns.'"
