Weather Warm Today.
With the temperature at 58, Pendleton is experiencing a taste of spring weather today. The minimum last night was 28. The barometer reading is 29.95 and still falling. Major Lee Moorhouse, weather observer, thinks that the weather indicates coming rain.

School Election Carries.
Sixty votes were cast in favor of the \$125,000 school budget and seven against it in the election held yesterday afternoon in the city hall. The budget insures an increase of nearly 50 per cent in teachers' pay for the year 1920-1921 over the scale originally adopted for the present year.

15 Families Under Quarantine.
There are now only 15 families under quarantine for contagious diseases in the city, according to John Halsey, Jr. About half are quarantined for flu and the other for smallpox. Health conditions are improving, he says.

Recording Transfers for Year.
The assessors office is now recording transfers of property made during the past year in preparation for taking the assessment of property for the 1920 roll. The office is getting materials ready for the field men to start on their work on March 1.

Corporation Estate Admitted.
The estate of the late Mrs. Sarah M. Corporation was admitted to probate today with W. D. Corporation as administrator. The estate is estimated to have been worth \$500. Andy B. Johnson, Claude Pritchett and John Irons were named appraisers.

Making Repairs to Jail.
With the county jail temporarily empty, repairs are being made today. The bathtub is being placed in a cement foundation to the floor and a new stove installed which heats the water for the men. Other minor necessary repairs are also being made.

Spence Named Executor.
C. E. Spence was today appointed executor of the estate of the late Mrs. Mary A. Woodward and administrator of the estate of the late David J. Woodward, both of whom died recently. The former left property valued at about \$3700 and the latter an estate of \$200. H. L. Frazier, H. M. Cookburn and Ben Osborn were named appraisers of both estates.

Steen Estate Worth \$63,121.11.
The estate left by Grant Steen, Milton farmer who died recently following an operation for appendicitis, has been appraised as worth \$63,121.11. Of this amount, \$55,250 was in real property, according to the estimate of J. H. Coffman, H. L. Frazier and W. W. Wasser, appraisers.

Want Law Interpreted.
Guy Cook yesterday afternoon pleaded not guilty in justice court to a charge of angling for fish within 200 feet of a fishway and has retained Raley, Raley & Steiner and H. J. Warner to contest the case. He was arrested below the Bailey dam near Hermiston while fishing for steelheads. Game Warden W. H. Albee having made the arrest. Mr. Cook maintains that he was more than 200 feet distant from the fish ladder. The warden interprets the law to mean 200 feet below any barrier containing a fishway. The date of the trial has not been set.

Mother of Local Woman Dies.
Mrs. J. C. Woodward received news this morning of the death of her mother, Mrs. H. J. Thomas, at Long Beach, California. Her death is believed to have been from heart disease from which she had been suffering. Mrs. Thomas who was 77 years of age, was a widow, her husband having died two years ago.
