Latest among the ancient and curious possessions of Major Moorhouse is a violin, showing evidence of a long and strenuous life, and

within whose case is the inscription: Joseph Guarnerius fecit Cremonae anno 1734 L. H. S. This indicates the major explains that Joseph made the violin at Cremona 136 years ago. The letters "L. H. S." are followed by a matted cross, the significance being, "In this sign conquer." On the neck of the old instrument is carved "Imperial Conservatory Violin." Real Strad violins have sold for as much as \$7500, clippings in Major Moorhouse's collection, show.

Schannep files for Judge.

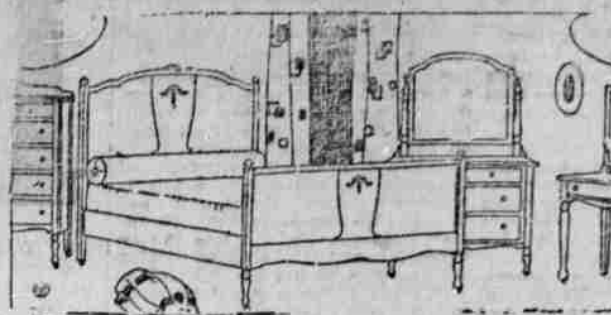
