FOUR BAKER LADS HELD ON CHARGE OF FORGING 11 CHECKS

Feat in Securing \$81 in Cash
Would do Credit to Master
of Game Say Officers, so Ac-
curate Are Signatures.

BAKER, Feb. 18.—Four boys, all 11 or 12 years old, are being held by the county officials on the charge of forging 11 checks for an aggregate of \$81 in a manner that would do credit, the officials say, to a master at the game. The checks were cashed by 11 stores and one farmer in still out. Several of the signatures were so accurately imitated that the checks passed unchallenged through one of the banks.

The boys are Claude Williams and Andrew Lunn, apprehended in La Grande, and Herbert Brown and Chalmers Wolfe. The names forged are John Dale and W. R. Bradley, Baker county residents.

Williams is believed to have done the writing, and he says that before he forged Mr. Dale's name he watched his victim in a local store while the

latter was signing his name to a check. The boy then went to the postoffice, procured a pen, and practiced the imitation until he had perfected it. Williams, the oldest of the four, says he is 12 years of age. The case will be handled by the juvenile authorities.

HERMISTON FARMERS PLAN HORSE SHOW

He has had matches with some of the best men in the country, according to Ralph Shaw, matchmaker for the legion. His name has been linked in matches with such grapplers as Ad Santell, John Berg and other light heavyweight stars. Geneck is anxious to make good before a Pendleton audience and feels that if he can take the measure of the local Round-Up star he will have put quite a feather in his hat.

Boxers Working Out. The boxers who will star in the smoker are all working out and will be in the pink of condition for the smoker. Many inquiries are coming in already from out of town regarding the event and evidences are that large delegations will be here from both ends of the county.
