OIL PROSPECTS STIR REGION OF SISKIYOU

MEDFORD, Feb. 18.—Excitement has developed south of the Siskiyou, according to word received here, over oil prospects. Much land on the south side of the mountains and many farms between Hill and Ager, Cal., are under lease. The California Oil Development company, said to be controlled by the Shell company, is planning to sink four wells and spend \$250,000 in exploring the field.

Four companies are in the field about Medford and drilling is expected to begin March 1.

An explosion of gasoline in the rear of the Central Cleaners added to the damage.
