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McADOO'S POSITION.

R. McADOO did not say, as some papers try to make their readers believe, that he declines to be a candidate for president. He declined to have his name put on the ballot in Georgia and suggested that as far as possible the delegates from the various states should go uninstructed. He further stated that in his opinion it is the duty of any man to accept a nomination for president should it come to him unsolicited.

In other words, it is apparent that McAdoo is a receptive candidate but not an active one. He is not seeking a nomination but will run if the national convention to be held at San Francisco considers him the most desirable man for the place. There are many who believe that the former secretary is the strongest presidential possibility in the field. He is a business executive of big calibre and one of the most forcible men in American public life. He is of the type needed in the white house and of those mentioned for the democratic nomination there is but one other in the McAdoo class—Herbert Hoover.

MECKNESS HAS ITS DRAWBACKS

AN OVERSEAS DIARY

(By Rev. J. M. Cornelson who served with the Y. M. C. A. overseas.)

Friday, Sept. 27.—When I arrived last night the men at "Y" headquarters were like a lot of orphans. Thought of all those things that Meredith says in "Lucifer" that we can live without, and then adds, "But where is the man that can live without cooks?" No French civilians have been in this territory for about four years and especially no women, so it was impossible to secure a civilian cook and all army men were in the lines. There was not a "Y" man that could boil water and not scorch it. Maybe that was a foolish thing I did a time or two back in Doullan when I cooked a meal in the absence of the madame. The corners of all mouths began to turn up when our good chief said, "Jimmy, can't you do the cooking till we get some one, provided we all help getting wood and water and washing dishes?" I agreed to do it.

About 9 p. m. a Hun plane came over. While we could hear the peculiar drone made by the German planes we could see nothing. Soon about a dozen powerful searchlights were playing in the darkness searching for it. Finally one caught it and focused on it. The plain then

stood out plain in the light just like a golden butterfly. Shrapnel began to burst all around it, as the anti-aircraft guns got into action. But that Dutchman came right on, evidently aiming for the big field hospital near Roisel. In a short while we could see tracer bullets going toward the Hun plane which meant that already an allied plane was up trying to get the range. This was followed by the rattling of a machine gun. We waited breathless to see the plane take a tumble, but it didn't happen. Shortly he maneuvered out of the lights and was never picked up any more. It was certainly a beautiful sight and a most interesting part of this great war craft. The fun was not all over yet. After midnight when all were asleep shells began to drop all around. I was so sound asleep that I didn't hear them till I heard some on calling. "Jimmy, Jimmy, are you going to the dugout?" Mr. Barnum, one of the drivers, in his haste with his blankets to the nearby dugout succeeded in falling into the top of the dugout and hurt himself worse than any of the shells hurt anyone at our place, though some Australians were killed by them. I was soon asleep again in my own bed for I had to get up very early to get breakfast for all.

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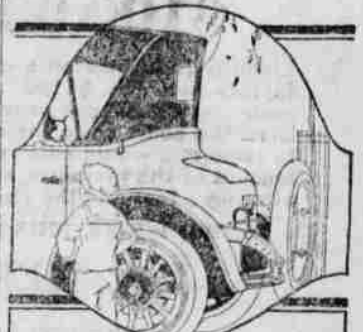
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
