

EDITORS, PUBLISHERS MEET AT EUGENE IN SECOND CONFERENCE

Two Day Annual Affair Will be Devoted to "Good Business" and "Good Editing" With Banquet to Fill Evening.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 20.—Editors and publishers of Oregon gathered here today for the second annual Oregon newspaper conference, which is being held under the auspices of the school of journalism at the University of Oregon and the State Editorial association.

It will be a two-day affair. The main entertainment feature will be a banquet which will be given the visitors by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce this evening.

The conference is divided into two main sections — "Good Business," which is being considered today, and "Good Editing," to which tomorrow's sessions will be devoted. A feature of the meeting this afternoon is an address which is being delivered by Henry M. Hastings, price expert of San Francisco, who is credited with having stabilized printing prices around the Golden Gate.

SINGLE COACH SYSTEM WILL BE SIDETRACKED FOR OLYMPIC ATHLETES

Committee Favors Trainers From Each Section of Country With Especial Attention to Individuals He Knows.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Old, beaten tracks are to be avoided by the American Olympic committee in training the team that will carry the United States emblem to Antwerp this summer.

Sidetracking the old single coaching system is one of the innovations being favored as the first step in the policy of applying more efficiency and new methods in the training of the team.

Everett C. Brown, Chicago, member of the committee, favors the selection of a coach from every section of the nation that is to have candidates for the team.

He suggests the appointment of head coach and trainer to be helped by a staff of assistants who are familiar with the men who will be selected to keep the world's athletic supremacy in America.

Seek Several Coaches.
Too many administrative duties, he points out, fall upon the shoulders of the head coach. He hasn't the time to take an individual interest in the members of the team.

The committee, faced by more urgent business in arranging the preliminaries, has not given much thought to the selection of a coach. The services of a team coach, the committee believes, are not imperative until the time just preceding the selection of the team.

However, most of the Olympic talk concerns the candidates for the trainer's position. Numerous eligibles are being recommended by their sectional followings.

Lawson Robertson, coach of the University of Pennsylvania and assistant to the late Mike Murphy at Stockholm, has a big following that wants to see him selected. H. W. Maloney, coach of Leland Stanford University, California, who trained the Yankee team for the inter-allied games in Paris, is another favorite. Jack Woolley of Cornell and "Foch" Donovan of Harvard, likewise are being mentioned.

More Trainers Than Athletes.
"Evidently we have more trainers for the team than we have athletes," Secretary Rubien, of the A. A. U., said a few days ago. "I have had more inquiries about the trainers' job than anything else in connection with the team. It seems to me that it is a secondary matter to the selection of the athletes and the financing of the trip to Belgium."

"Most of the men selected will train at their homes until a short time before the date of sailing and the length of time they will have over there will be so short before the opening of the games that they will not need a trainer. No member of the team will arrive in Belgium to get into condition. Trainer's importance to a team it will be well to consider that some of the best athletes in the Olympic games of the past never had a professional trainer. For instance, who taught Almah Richards to jump? He learned the game himself as well as Hannes Kolehmainen, the Finn; Jean Poulin, the Frenchman; and Arnold Jackson, who won the 1500 metres run."

CONTRACT SIGNED FOR SALE OF 1920 HOP CROP

SALEM, Or., Feb. 20.—A contract was signed here yesterday whereby Henry L. Bents of Aurora will sell his entire crop of hops for the year 1920 to Strauss & Co. of England at a stipulated price of 37 cents a pound. He will also receive the same price for his hops in 1921, under the provisions of the contract, while in the year 1922 the price is fixed at 36 cents a pound. It is understood that several other similar contracts have been negotiated with local hop growers during the past few days.

Mr. Bents and other growers who recently agreed to sell their hops to the English concern will receive 2 cents more per pound than the price stipulated in previous contracts executed here this year and filed with the county recorder.

EDSEL FORD CHARGED WITH DRAFT EVASION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—In a speech in the senate yesterday Senator Sherman asserted that Edsel Ford, son of Henry Ford, was indicted from the draft by an "executive official" in the white house.

Sherman made the allegation during a speech criticizing Henry Ford. He criticized the appropriation of funds for the River Rouge project in connection with the building of Ford's submarine chasers during the war. 200 per cent profit, Sherman said. Financial difficulties at Stanford University may prevent the holding of the annual intercollegiate rowing regatta between Stanford, California and Washington universities on May 7, according to word from Seattle. The Crimson oarsmen have notified the Sun Dodgers that the trip north is out of the question at this time.

Coincident with the Stanford telegram came word from Berkeley, to the effect that the California oarsmen will not be able to compete on Lake Washington May 7 as scheduled, but will be able to contend with the Northern team May 22.

It is thought at Washington that Stanford will not be entered in the regatta. California, however, is willing and able to pull out in the north. It is probable that the meet will be a dual affair. May 22 is acceptable to the State Institute of Candidate Manager Melness said today.

WHITMAN RUNS AWAY WITH SECOND BATTLE

Whitman College showed its championship caliber by again trouncing the Oregon Agricultural College 43 to 22 on the Whitman floor before the largest crowd that have ever attended a basketball game in the Garden City. The victory over the orange and black gives the Missionaries two straight wins and places them near the top of the heap in the northwest conference. The first night's game ended 50 to 16.

WOULD MAKE CRIME OF TALKING TO MOTORMAN
