## COLLEGE PRESIDENTS POINT OUT EXTENT OF SACRIFICE TAX ASKS

### One 10-Cent Cigar a Week Less or One New Tie in Year is Average Burden of Mammoth Educational Benefit.

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—One 10-cent cigar a week less for the smoker, or one new silk tie less in a year for any other man is just about what it is going to cost the average taxpayer if the increased levy of 1.24 mills asked by the state educational institutions is put over at the next election.

This is according to the reckoning of President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon, who was one of the speakers yesterday at the City club luncheon at the Benson. The other speaker was President W. J. Kerr, of Oregon Agricultural college, who spoke of the phenomenal increase in

attendance at the Corvallis college.

### Not Extravagant.

Both men declared that the total of two mills is not extravagant as compared with the amount received elsewhere in similar schools and pointed out that Washington is asking for three mills.

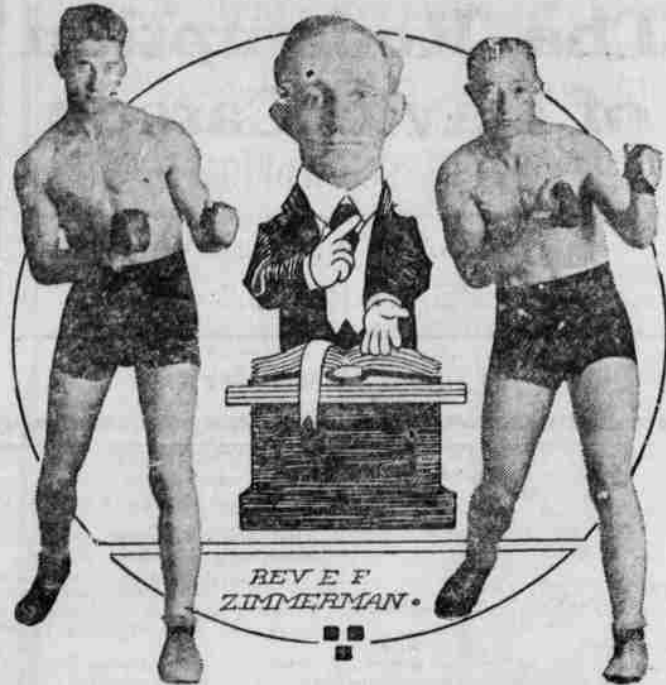
"Let us frankly face the situation," said President Campbell. "It will mean a heavy burden, but the state was never better able to meet it than now. If it isn't put over 1920, young men and women must be turned away from our institutions of higher education next year. The returns are tremendous and the hardship is very slight in comparison."

### Appropriation Ceases.

Among the difficulties the school must face next fall, he said, was the cessation of the special appropriation which brought the university's share up to one mill. This will return it to the .74 mill previously allowed. This is not sufficient to care for the increased attendance and does not provide salaries for instructors to meet the competition offered elsewhere. Failure, both educators said, would mean that the schools must lose some of their best faculty members.

## WASHINGTON AGREES ON STANFORD MELEE

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—After protesting vainly against the new 50-50 split rule adopted by the northwest college conference for football receipts the University of Washington finally has swung around to it. Contracts were signed last week for two games with Stanford university under an agreement to split the receipts 50-50. Washington has been bucking on a contract with the Oregon Agricultural college demanding that if the Aggies play in Seattle under those terms the second game will have to be played in Portland.

Washington's new schedule now includes games with Idaho, Whitman, Oregon, Stanford and a Turkey day game at Seattle with Dartmouth. Washington plays only two coast conference games, so it is likely Manager Meenost will get together with Manager Richardson of the Oregon Aggies and agree to a contract mutually beneficial.

O'Brien is Working Out Here and Battle Looms; Ray McCarroll Will Meet Geneck and Hayes on Mat.

Henry Kreiger, who is to meet Danny O'Brien in the wind-up of the American Legion smoker here next Saturday night, will arrive in Pendleton on No. 4, Tuesday morning, according to a letter received from Bob Swazey, his manager, by Matchmaker Ralph Shaw yesterday. Kreiger is in training in Portland now, while O'Brien is doing his working out here. "Kreiger will be in excellent shape for O'Brien and I am sure he will win by the knock-out route," Swazey writes. "He is training and boxing every day" with Pete Mitchell, who is scheduled to fight Fugy Morton at a local smoker. If he wins against O'Brien, of which I am sure, I should like to treat with you about putting him on at your smoker following the one on the 25th."

Manager Will Not Come. Swazey will not accompany his protege to Pendleton but the local boys are arranging to see that the fighter is well looked after. His manager is on the sport staff of the Oregon Journal and is kept busy watching the boxing game in the Rose city, which is now on the boom. The three sets of boys who will box in the preliminaries are working hard for the matches and McCarroll, wrestler, is also getting into shape. The Round-Up star is scheduled to take on two men in the one evening.

McCarroll to Meet Two. Louis Geneck, who will weigh 175 by the time of the match, is a recent addition to the Pendleton order of grapplers but believes he can take McCarroll's measure. After their bout, McCarroll will go on with Ed Hayes, an Indian from the reservation. Letters and requests are coming in from service men all over the county asking about the big affair that is to be staged a week from tonight. The details are that both ends of the county will be well represented and that Eagle-Woodmen hall will be filled to capacity.

## TOMBSTONE JURYMAN WOUNDED BY GUNSHOT

TOMBSTONE, Ariz., Feb. 21.—R. T. Lewis, one of the first jury men passed in the Bisbee deportation trials, is in a Douglas hospital, seriously wounded, and J. B. Seal a neighboring rancher, of Lewis, is free on bonds here, after surrendering himself and confessing he shot Lewis. Lewis is a rancher at McNeil. According to a story told by Seal, he shot Lewis when the latter made movements as though to draw a gun after having threatened to shoot Seal's young brother for wiring a gate closed. After the shooting Seal went to the home of another neighbor and notified the authorities. The shooting occurred Wednesday near the Pinar mine, about eight miles north of McNeil. The shoot will remove Lewis from the Wootton case and leave but 16 jurors in the box. Court will convene again today after a two days' recess.
