Vapors Important—For these troubles a large part of the value of Vicks lies in its vaporizing qualities. "I have your new number for you," said the manager. "Shall I bring it over or give it to you over the wire?" "Who is this?" asked the city official.

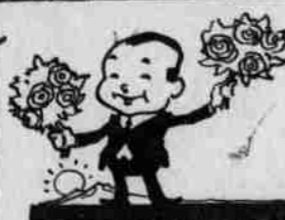
"The district commercial manager of the telephone company," repeated the caller.
