New Oven Installed.

A revolving oven, which bakes 80 pound and a half loaves of bread at one time, is in operation at Hohbach's bakery on Court street. The oven, which was recently installed by Otto Hohbach, has a window which makes it possible to see the bread baking. Heat is supplied by gas but the revolving apparatus which turns the bread around in the oven, is run by electricity. The oven is filled three times daily with specially made pans which fit into trays. The remainder of the output of bread from the bakery is baked in the large ovens owned by the bakery.
