FARMERS OF WEST END OF COUNTY MAKE SILO TOUR TO VIEW RESULTS

Farmers of the west end of the county are making a silo tour in the west end of the county today under the auspices of the county Farm Bureau, to investigate the results obtained by farmers who are using ensilage to feed stock.

Silo owners, and others interested, met today at 1:30 p. m. at the Stanfield creamery. This afternoon they are visiting the Hampton and Gullford silo near Echo, where 1,000 head of pure bred Hampshire sheep are fed by silo, and the Hawley Bean and Zoe Houser silos in the Echo region. Other silos that will be visited are those of P. P. Sullivan, Henry Sommerer and Charles Baker, of Hermiston, and of Mack Johnson, Louis Attebury, Jim Kyle and F. A. Baker, of Stanfield.

POLICE INTERRUPT BORDER BULL FIGHT

OFFICIALS CONFER ON GRAND JURY'S REPORT IN MAX Houser CASE

Assistant District Attorney Humphreys and Special Agent Byron Start Thorough Digest of Evidence.

SPOKANE, Feb. 24.—A full and thorough examination of the Spokane grand jury's recent report on the grain corporation's activities under the direction of Max H. Houser of Portland, vice-president of the United States Grain corporation, and of the evidence on which the report was based, will be made by Lester W. Humphreys, assistant United States district attorney of Portland and William Byron, a special agent of the United States department of justice, who arrived in Spokane yesterday. They were in consultation with United States Attorney E. A. Garrecht and assistant United States Attorney C. H. Leavy during the day.

"I have nothing to say about the matter other than that I am here to make such an investigation," said Mr. Humphreys today. "I have been ordered to do so by Attorney-General Palmer and will make my report to him. I do not know how long I will be here, but it may be more than a week."

He was asked if his investigation would involve a thorough digest of the grand jury report and all evidence on which it was based.

"Yes," he replied. "That will be our work here."

The conference Monday with United States Attorney Garrecht, Mr. Leavy and Special Agent Watt of the department of justice lasted several hours. Inasmuch as the day was a holiday in the federal building, active investigation of the case was not started until today.

CALIFORNIA TO PLAY SERIES WITH PULLMAN

The University of California's invasion of the northwest begins tonight when the Bears meet Washington State College in the Pullman symposium. There will be games tonight and tomorrow, the contests being played as a part of the coast conference schedule.

Until yesterday it was thought that the games would have to be played in Spokane owing to the influenza ban at Pullman. It was lifted yesterday by the authorities, and arrangements made for the games to be held at the college.

W. S. C. just completed a successful series against the Oregon Aggies last week, taking the orange and black down the line in two games. The state college has had an up and down season, however, and the Bears stand a good chance of taking both games, as they did against Oregon in the south.

SEATTLE WILL STAGE WRESTLING TOURNEY

SEATTLE, Feb. 24.—Amateur wrestlers of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia will meet at the University of Washington gymnasium March 19 and 20 to decide the A. A. U. Pacific northwest wrestling championship. Colleges, American Legion posts and other organizations are expected to be represented. The tournament will be held under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian association.

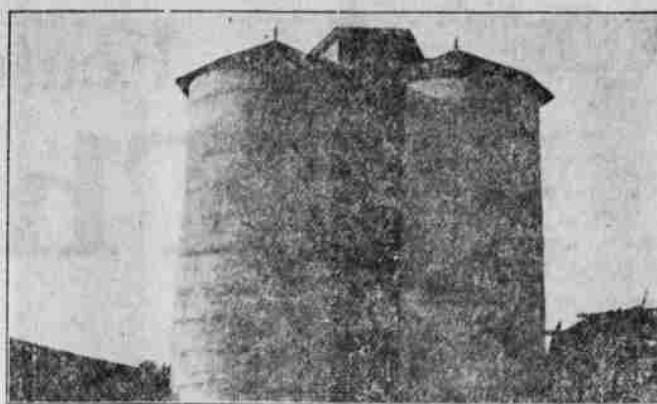
ST. PAUL MAN LEAVES WITH \$6000 IN CASH
