WIDE PROSECUTION OF SALMON PACKERS APPEARS PROBABLE

Canning of Spoiled Fish, Particularly by Operators in Alaska, is Charge Made in Army Investigation.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Intimations that there yet may be wholesale prosecution of salmon packers, particularly those operating in Alaska, for canning spoiled fish, and defense from the army standpoint of the resale contract made with packers for return of the 1918 crop to packers after disclosure of extensive spoilage last summer featured testimony in the army salmon investigation before the effluent subcommittee.

Dr. Carl L. Alsberg, chief of the bureau of chemistry, and several experts from his bureau, testified to examinations by request of the war department which resulted in rejection of 75,000 to 100,000 cases. Where more than 10 per cent of the cans in a selected case were bad, rejection was ordered.

Ordered to Prosecute.
Dr. Alsberg testified that the evidence is clear of law violation by canners because the fish was placed in cans when already tainted. Asked by Chairman Reavis why prosecutions have not resumed, Alsberg said he has not ordered prosecutions "so far" because he understood from the war department that this might interfere with settlements between the government and the packers.

Alsberg was advised by all members of the subcommittee, which consists of Reavis of Nebraska and McGregor and Donovan of New York, to proceed with prosecutions, the statute of limitations not yet having expired. Alsberg intimated that he believed this advice is sound.

BIG AVIATION FIELD PLANNED AT MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Feb. 27.—Medford expects to have one of the largest and

best aviation fields in the United States. It was decided at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon Wednesday to locate the field on the Gore tract of 200 acres of level land just north-west of the end of Jackson street, and the aviation committee of the chamber was instructed to notify the government that the field will be ready for the aviators on April 1. City water telephone connections, lights and hangars for the machines and landing markers will be put in by the chamber.

SCHOOL OF COMMERCE GRANTS B. A. DEGREE TO ARMY LIEUTENANT

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 27.—Lieutenant Alexander Pearson Jr., a member of the class of 1917 was granted a B. A. degree from the school of commerce Wednesday. Lieutenant Pearson joined the army in 1917. He is still in the service, and is visiting his parents in Portland.

Pearson was one of the pilots who made the transcontinental flight in army planes last fall. He attended flying school at San Diego. After being assigned to different camps about the United States, he was finally sent to Wilbur Wright field as an instructor.

"I feel confident that it is not necessary to dwell at length upon my gratitude to you for the honor implied in your letter of February 22. I especially appreciate it since I was not identified with the democratic party before the war, and my official connection with the government has been solely a war service, and consequently not of a partisan character."

CLEVELAND, Feb. 27.—Albert Challengingworth swallowed the evidence in a prohibition enforcement case but the police got it out of him with a stomach pump. When Harry Weiss was brought into court here today charged with selling liquor, the police brought into court a chemist, the city physician a small bottle of liquor—and Challengingworth. The police charged that when they raided Weiss' place, Challengingworth

quickly swallowed a large drink of whiskey to prevent its use as evidence. Not to be outdone, the police rushed Challengingworth to the city hospital, where a stomach pump was applied.
