Nursing Committee to Meet.

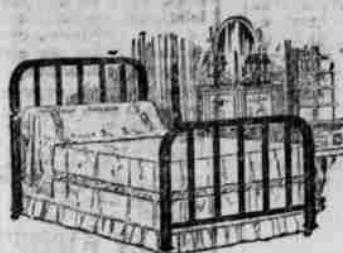
Members of the nursing committee of the Red Cross are to meet tonight in the Red Cross office at 7:30. Reports will be read by the nurses employed by the Red Cross.

King of Crooks MAY BE CULPRIT IN BANK ROBBERY

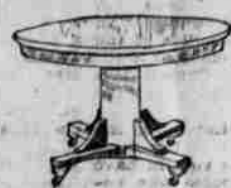
HELENA, March 1.—The defense began Saturday in the trial of Charles Stevens, a former clerk in the Union Bank and Trust company, on a charge of taking \$40,000 of the funds of the bank. James Ford, one of several men implicated in the "confessions" alleged by the accused, was called. He denied all knowledge of the robbery. Ford was released soon after Stevens made a confession in which he was omitted and a new set of men involved.
