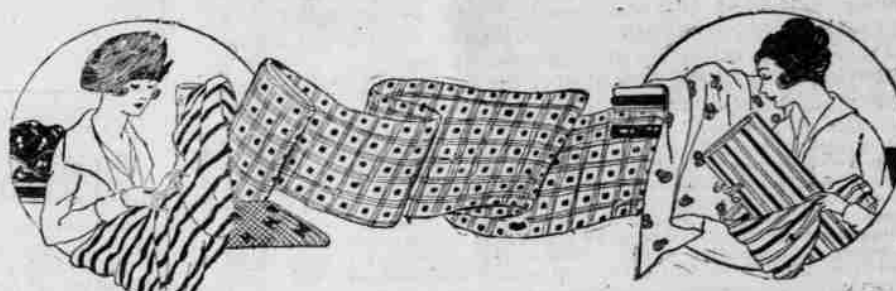

## Start Membership Drive

The Woodmen of the World started Monday on a three months' drive for new members here, with two teams of 12 men each competing and the remainder of the lodge of general committee to propose new members. The campaign will close June 1 with a big gathering at which the losing team will banquet the winners. White buttons, lettered in red, are being worn by the members to advertise the drive.

## Bonds Will Be Exchanged

The last interest coupons on three issues of U. S. Liberty bonds will be clipped on March 15 and April 15 and the government is preparing, through the various banks, to exchange the bonds for those bearing coupons for the remainder of the life of the bond.

On and after March 15, bonds of the second loan will be available at local banks in the 4-1-4 per cent denomination, and of the first loan on and after April 15. The last interest coupons on these bonds came due last fall, but were given in place of those bonds. The last coupon on the third loan (bonds) is payable March 15 and about June 15 new bonds bearing coupons for the remainder of the life of the bond, will be available.

## Clothing School at Umatine

The clothing school given under the auspices of Miss Ella May Harmon, home demonstration agent, will open Thursday in Umatine and will continue on Friday and Saturday. Miss Jessie Biles, of O. A. C., will be in Umatine for the school. Her first lecture will be on the use of commercial patterns, and their alteration to suit the irregular figure. On Friday will

be taken up problems in garment construction, spreading and shrinking, cutting, fitting, basting, tailor basting, seam finishing, pressing and other problems of the home dressmaker. In the Saturday program will be the making of children's dresses and discussion of problems in the making of children's clothing. Anyone who wishes advice on making over clothes or making new clothes is invited to bring the sewing to the school. Women may bring needle, thread and thimble and Miss Harmon and Miss Biles will instruct and advise.
